The home is fished in Crab Orchard stone. Another unusual feature apparent from the outside is the driveway of green concrete the color impregnated when the cement was mixed. The home is situated at 1609 Mayfield avenue, in the midst a subdivision built by the brothers. The chimney serves fireplaces both in the living room and in the basement. I home is a large one, containing an ample living room, a dining room, kitchen and dinette, a den, three bedrooms a two-car garage. The kitchen is a big room, with a U-shaped work center at one end and a breakfast area at other. The walls in the living room and dining room are textured plaster. Draperies are alternate widths of great and yellow fabric, with green cornices.







Among them are the pearl gray kitchen, with the sink set in a corner under the windows and with a "food island" in the middle of the room. The roof of the garage serves as a sun deck for the second floor. The interior, with smooth plaster finishes, has a figured turquoise color scheme in the front hall, co-oa brown in the living and dining rooms, mauve and gray in the master bedroom, forest green and cherry red in the second bedroom and red, white and blue in the third bedroom. The fireplace is faced with Italian marble. There is a tufted beige full carpet downstairs and a light effect is gained in the hall by means of ribbed glass insets at the front door. The exterior finish is yellow brick with wooden battens.











A two-decker fireplace, opening on the main floor and also in the basement, is a feature of the ranch-type house. The living room offers a full view to the north from an expanse of thermal pane glass. Mrs. Mann designed the kitchen which uses both wall-paper and painted surface as part of its decorative scheme and which has a glass table for breakfasting. The house has two baths on the main floor and one in the basement. Gas forced air is the method of heating.

TWO "REC" ROOMS—This exquisite ranch-style home is the property of Frank E. Brown, local Cadillac dealer. Located at 809 Grand boulevard, the dwelling contains six regular rooms, three bathrooms and two recreation rooms with fireplaces. Included in the six regular rooms are three bedrooms. The "rec" rooms are located in the full basement and on the ground-level floor. A barbeque fireplace is situated in the "rec" room on the first floor while regular fireplaces are included in the other recreation room and in the living room. The two bathrooms on the ground floor are finished in two-tone tiles, are specially ventilated and contain combination wash basins and dressing tables. The kitchen is entirely electrified and includes an automatic washing machine. Another bathroom with a shower is situated in the basement. Heated by forced hot-air, the home is also completely air-conditioned. A one-car garage is connected to the dwelling which is constructed of Joliet limestone.


