CITY OF JOLIET, ILLINOIS SUBSTANTIAL AMENDMENT FY 2011 THROUGH 2014 CDBG & HOME PROGRAM YEARS

A. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY –

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) had put a hold on the City of Joliet's FY 2011, 2012, and 2013 CDBG and HOME Programs, and recently released the City's funds in the Fall of 2013. FY 2014 funds were received in the Fall of 2014 which was 12 months after the beginning of the Federal Fiscal Year. This was followed by the court ruling in October 2014, that the City of Joliet has a right to condemn the Evergreen Terrace Housing Development in the City.

The City of Joliet and the owners of Evergreen Terrace have submitted their values of the property based on outside independent appraisals. The City and the owners of the property can now negotiate a settlement that includes the purchase price, time of transfer of ownership and other consideration without proceeding to trial. However, if an agreement isn't reached, a trial date is scheduled to begin in March 2015, which will establish the value of the property.

The City proposes to acquire the property and eliminate a blighting influence in the neighborhood, and provide decent, safe, sound and affordable housing for the low/moderate income residents of Evergreen Terrace. The City has selected the Holsten Management Group to assist in the redevelopment efforts of Evergreen Terrace.

Evergreen Terrace is comprised of Evergreen Terrace I which has 241 housing units and Evergreen Terrace II which has 115 units. Evergreen Terrace I includes three multi-story elevator apartment buildings to the east of North Broadway, and one 3 story apartment building to the west of North Broadway. Evergreen Terrace II includes three multi-story apartment buildings located off Bluff Street. The development also includes an administrative building that houses maintenance equipment and a community space for the tenants. There is also a parking area on the south side of Western Avenue that is also utilized by the adjacent neighborhood park.

The redevelopment of Evergreen Terrace into a mixed-income housing development will be guided by the Settlement Agreements between the City of Joliet, HUD, and the tenants of Evergreen Terrace. This agreement proposes the acquisition of the housing development, rehabilitation of some of the existing buildings, demolition of other buildings, construction of new housing units, the community center, and the development of a new park facility along the Des Plaines River. It is anticipated that this redevelopment effort will occur over multiple phases and each phase will take approximately 4 to 5 years to complete.

This redevelopment effort will utilize multiple years of CDBG funds, HOME funds, Low Income Housing Tax Credits, Illinois Housing Trust funds, and other potential housing development funds.

In order to complete the first phase of the project, the City of Joliet will utilize 4 years of its existing CDBG funds to begin the acquisition of the site and for planning and initial redevelopment costs.

The City is also proposing the development of a splash pad and other improvements to the Bi-Centennial Park, a neighborhood park and playground facility located at 201 West Jefferson Street. CDBG funds will be budgeted for each of the four years of the CDBG Programs. The City's General Administrative line item budget amounts will be reduced to \$50,000 for each of the four years.

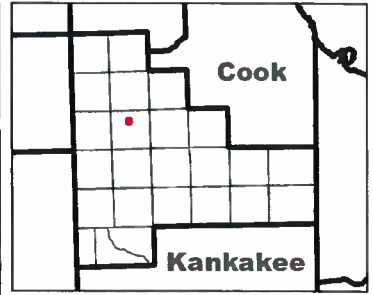
In regard to the HOME Program budgets, the City is proposing to provide funds to a local CHDO (Cornerstone) to rehabilitate existing group homes and apartments that they own or will acquire.

The City is also proposing to construct 6 new single family homes on scattered sites for sale to lower income households. Lastly, under the FY 2014 HOME Program, the City proposes to allocate funds for lower income households for downpayment assistance in the purchase of an affordable home.

Other revisions, changes in budget amounts and the deletion of previously approved line items are also being proposed. This Substantial Amendment will allow the City to expend its CDBG and HOME Funds in an expeditious manner and bring it into timeliness compliance with HUD.



Evergreen Terrace



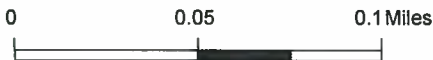



1. Introduction

The City of Joliet, Illinois is an entitlement community under the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development's (HUD) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. The City also receives entitlement funds under the HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program. In compliance with the HUD regulations, the City of Joliet has prepared this FY 2015-2019 Five Year Consolidated Plan for the period of January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2019. This consolidated plan is a strategic plan for the implementation of the City's Federal Programs for housing, community and economic development within the City of Joliet.

The Five Year Consolidated Plan establishes the City's goals for the next five (5) year period and outlines the specific initiatives the City will undertake to address its needs and objectives by promoting the rehabilitation and construction of decent, safe, sanitary, and affordable housing, creating a suitable living environment, removing slums and blighting conditions, promoting fair housing, improving public services, expanding economic opportunities, and other activities principally benefitting low- and moderate-income persons.

This Five Year Consolidated Plan is a collaborative effort of the City of Joliet, the community at large, social service agencies, City officials, housing providers, community development agencies, and economic development groups. The planning process was accomplished through a series of public meetings, stakeholder interviews, resident surveys, statistical data, and review of previous community development plans.

2. Summary of the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan Needs Assessment Overview

The following six (6) priorities and subsequent goals/strategies have been identified for the City of Joliet for the period of FY 2015 through FY 2019 for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program and HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program:

HOUSING PRIORITY – (High Priority)

There is a need to improve the quality of the housing stock in the community by increasing the amount of decent, safe, sound, and accessible housing for homeowners, renters, and homebuyers that is affordable to low- and moderate-income persons and families.

Goals/Strategies:

HS-1 Housing Rehabilitation - Continue to provide financial assistance to low- and moderate-income homeowners to rehabilitate their existing owner-occupied housing.

HS-2 Rental Rehabilitation – Provide financial assistance to landlords to rehabilitate housing units that are rented to low- and moderate-income tenants.

HS-3 Housing Construction - Increase the supply of decent, safe, sound, and accessible housing that is affordable to owners and renters in the community through rehabilitation of vacant buildings and new construction.

HS-4 Fair Housing - Promote fair housing choice through education and outreach in the community.

HS-5 Home Ownership - Assist low- and moderate-income households to become homeowners by providing down payment assistance, closing cost assistance, and requiring housing counseling training.

HS-6 Public Housing – Support the local public housing authority in its efforts to improve public housing by constructing new affordable housing on scattered sites throughout the community to replace deteriorated public housing.

HOMELESS PRIORITY – (High Priority)

There is a need for housing and support services for homeless persons, and persons who are at-risk of becoming homeless.

Goals/Strategies:

HO-1 Continuum of Care - Support the local Continuum of Care's (CoC) efforts to provide emergency shelter, transitional housing, and permanent supportive housing to persons and families who are homeless or who are at risk of becoming homeless.

HO-2 Operation/Support - Assist providers in the operation of housing and support services for the homeless and persons at-risk of becoming homeless.

HO-3 Permanent Housing – Support the development of permanent supportive housing for homeless individuals and families.

HO-4 Housing – Support the rehabilitation of and making accessibility improvements to emergency shelters, transitional housing and permanent housing for the homeless.

OTHER SPECIAL NEEDS PRIORITY – (Low Priority)

There is a continuing need for affordable housing, services, and facilities for persons with special needs and the disabled.

Goals/Strategies:

SN-1 Housing - Increase the supply of affordable, decent, safe, sound, and accessible housing for the elderly, persons with disabilities, and persons with other special needs through rehabilitation of existing buildings and new construction.

SN-2 Social Services - Support social service programs and facilities for the elderly, persons with disabilities, and persons with other special needs.

SN-3 Accessibility – Improve the accessibility of owner occupied housing through rehabilitation and improve renter occupied housing by making reasonable accommodations for the physically disabled.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PRIORITY - (High Priority)

There is a need to improve the public and community facilities, infrastructure, public services, and the quality of life for all residents in the community.

Goals/Strategies:

CD-1 Community Facilities - Improve the parks, recreational centers, trails, libraries, and all public and community facilities in the municipality.

CD-2 Infrastructure - Improve the public infrastructure through rehabilitation, reconstruction, and new construction.

CD-3 Public Services - Improve and increase public safety, municipal services, and public service programs throughout the community.

CD-4 Accessibility – Improve the physical and visual accessibility of community facilities, infrastructure, and public buildings.

CD-5 Public Safety - Improve the public safety facilities, equipment, and ability to respond to emergency situations.

CD-6 Code Enforcement – Enforce the local codes and ordinances to bring buildings into compliance with the standards through systematic code enforcement.

CD-7 Clearance – Remove and eliminate slum and blighting conditions through demolition of vacant, abandoned and dilapidated structures.

CD-8 Revitalization – Promote neighborhood revitalization in strategic areas through acquisition, demolition, rehabilitation, code enforcement, infrastructure improvements, housing construction, public and community facilities improvements, etc.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PRIORITY - (Low Priority)

There is a need to increase employment, self-sufficiency, education, job training, technical assistance, and economic empowerment of low and moderate income residents in the community.

Goals/Strategies:

ED-1 Employment - Support and encourage new job creation, job retention, employment, and job training services.

ED-2 Financial Assistance - Support business and commercial growth through expansion and new development through technical assistance programs and low interest loans.

ED-3 Redevelopment Program - Plan and promote the development and redevelopment of the downtown business district.

ED-4 Financial Incentives – Support and encourage new economic development through local, state and Federal tax incentives and programs such as Tax Incremental Financing (TIF), tax abatements, Enterprise Zones/Entitlement Communities, Section 108 Loan Guarantees, Economic Development Initiative (EDI) funds, etc.

ADMINISTRATION, PLANNING, AND MANAGEMENT PRIORITY - (High Priority)

There is a continuing need for planning, administration, management, and oversight of Federal, state, and local funded programs.

Goal/Strategy:

AM-1 Overall Coordination - Provide program management and oversight for the successful administration of Federal, state, and local funded programs, including planning services for special studies, environmental clearance, fair housing, and compliance with all Federal, state, and local laws and regulations.

3. Evaluation of past performance

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) had placed a hold on the City of Joliet's FY 2011, 2012 and 2013 CDBG and HOME funds. HUD didn't release the hold until the fall of 2013. FY 2014 CDBG and HOME funds were not received until the fall of 2014, 12 months after the beginning of the Federal Fiscal Year. Needless to say, the City therefore does not meet the HUD maximum drawdown ratio of 1.5 and is not in compliance with the HUD regulations.

The City has prepared and submitted to HUD its Timeliness Report for 2015 which outlines the City's plan to expend funds and bring its expenditure ratio into compliance. The City is awaiting HUD review and acceptance of its timeliness report.

4. Summary of citizen participation process and consultation process

The City of Joliet has followed its Citizen Participation Plan in the planning and preparation of the Five Year Consolidated Plan. The City held its first public hearing on the needs of the community and its residents on July 16, 2014. This provided the residents, agencies and organizations with the opportunity to discuss the City's CDBG and HOME Programs and to provide suggestions for future CDBG and HOME Programs priorities and activities.

The City's Community Development Department maintains a mailing list for its CDBG Program and sends out copies of its public hearings notices and meetings concerning the CDBG Program. Notices are sent to all agencies and individuals who have participated in previous programs and activities.

A copy of the "Draft Five Year Consolidated Plan and the FY 2015 Annual Action Plan" was placed on public display for review by the general public agencies and organizations in the community. A newspaper notice announcing that these documents were placed on public display was published in "The Herald-News," the newspaper of general circulation in the area. The "Draft Five Year Consolidated plan and the FY 2015 Annual Action Plan" were on public display at the following locations:

- Joliet City Hall, Neighborhood Services Office, 150 West Jefferson Street
- Joliet City Hall, City Clerk's Office, 150 West Jefferson Street
- Joliet Public Library, 150 N. Ottawa Street
- Joliet Public Library, 3395 Black Road

A resident survey was prepared in English and Spanish. Surveys were accepted from July 16, 2014 through February 28, 2015. Copies were placed on the City's website. The results of the survey were used to help determine the goals and outcomes. A more detailed analysis and description of the citizen participation process is contained in section PR-15, "Citizen Participation."

5. Summary of public comments

The City of Joliet held its First Public Hearing on July 16, 2014 at 6:00 PM. Comments received at that public hearing are included in the attachments at the end of the Five Year Plan.

The Five Year Consolidated Plan and FY 2015 Annual Action Plan were placed on public display from March 6 to April 6, 2015. A Second Public Hearing was held on Tuesday, March 17, 2015. Comments that were received at the Second Public Hearing and during the display period are included in the attachments at the end of the Five Year Consolidated Plan.

6. Summary of comments or views not accepted and the reasons for not accepting them

All comments and suggestions that were received to date, have been accepted and incorporated into the planning document.

7. Summary

The main goals of the Five Year Consolidated Plan are to improve the living conditions of all residents in the City of Joliet, create a suitable and sustainable living environment, and to address the housing and community development needs of the City's residents.

The Five Year Consolidated Planning process requires that the City prepare in a single document its strategies and goals to address housing needs; establish and maintain a suitable living environment; and to encourage economic opportunities for every resident. The City will use the Consolidated Plan's goals to allocate CDBG and HOME funds over the next five (5) years and to provide direction to its strategic partners, participating agencies, and stakeholder organizations to address the housing and community development needs of the low- and moderate-income residents of the City of Joliet. HUD will evaluate the City's performance based on the goals established in the Five Year Consolidated Plan.

While preparing the FY 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and FY 2015 Annual Action Plan, the City of Joliet consulted with the Joliet Housing Authority, social services agencies, housing providers, and members of the Will County Continuum of Care. An online survey was created for stakeholders and residents to complete which identified needs, gaps in the system, and programmatic goals for the next five years. Input from the meetings and surveys were used in the development of specific strategies and priorities for the Five Year Plan.

The City of Joliet works with the following agencies to enhance coordination:

- **Joliet Housing Authority** – The City provides funds for improvements to public housing communities.
- **Social Services Agencies** – The City provides funds to improve services to low and moderate income persons.
- **Housing Providers** – The City provides funds to rehabilitate and develop affordable housing and provide housing options for low and moderate income households.

Each year, as part of the CDBG application planning process, local agencies, and organization are invited to submit proposals for CDBG funds for eligible activities. These groups participate in the planning process by attending the public hearings, informational meetings, and completing survey forms.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness

The City of Joliet is a member of the Joliet/Bolingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care. The Joliet/Bolingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care is administered by the Will County Center for Community Concerns. The City's Director of Neighborhood Services sits on the Joliet/Bolingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care Leadership Committee as the Vice-Chair and acts as the City's representative. The City coordinates its activities with the Continuum of Care and supports its applications for funding. The City helps the Joliet/Bolingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care to address homelessness by working together to develop a framework to deliver housing and supportive services to the homeless.

Describe consultation with the Continuum(s) of Care that serves the jurisdiction's area in determining how to allocate ESG funds, develop performance standards and evaluate outcomes, and develop funding, policies and procedures for the administration of HMIS

The Joliet/Bolingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care acts as the oversight and planning body for preventing and ending homelessness for the CoC general membership body. The Leadership Committee sets policy based on the knowledge and experience of its members. The Leadership Committee sets priorities and makes funding decisions on the eligible applications for funding.

Other members of the Leadership Committee consist of the social service agencies, shelter providers, housing providers, and the local representation of the IL Department of Employment Security, as well as additional representatives. Coordination of the programs and funds is accomplished by the CoC Leadership Committee for the chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and unaccompanied youth, along with the administration of the HMIS System.

The Joliet/Bolingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care is comprised of four (4) other committees: the Housing/Plan to End Homelessness Committee; Education/Support Services Committee; Grants Funding and Ranking Committees; and Consumer Committee.

Housing/Plan to End Homelessness Committee: Strategically plan and coordinate CoC efforts relating to all housing issues which include: Coordinated Assessment, Point-In-Time Counts, Housing Inventory, Homeless Prevention, Rapid Re-Housing, Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, Permanent Supportive Housing, and access to affordable housing resources in the community. The Committee/members collaborate with advocacy organizations and other local, state, and national planning entities; oversee discharge planning and disaster preparedness initiatives; provide ongoing development of the 10-Year Plan; and plans interventions for chronically homeless persons.

Education/Support Services Committee: Strategically plan and coordinate CoC efforts relating to education or support service issues which include: access to mainstream benefits; planning/hosting the annual Mainstream Benefits Forum, Information Forum, and Education Symposium trainings; develop practices to ensure that all homeless children are enrolled in school and connected to appropriate services within the community; coordinate specialized education and training to clients in supportive housing; address employment and transportation related issues; and provide networking, general support, and/or technical assistance to direct client service staff or local homeless services providers, mainstream benefit providers, and school district homeless liaisons.

Grants Funding and Ranking Committees: The Grants Funding Committee is comprised of CoC-funding applicants, oversees CoC project and consolidated applications, identifies funding opportunities, and ensures equal opportunity of all organizations that wish to pursue funding opportunities. The Ranking Committee is comprised of objective, unbiased, third-party community members from non-CoC funded organizations; reviews projects for selection and prioritization in the CoC NOFA competition and other

CoC funding opportunities (i.e., ESG program); systematically analyzes project performance; and reviews monitoring/auditing as is required or necessary.

Consumer Committee: The conduit by which homeless and formerly homeless persons participate in the community's planning efforts and take action to prevent and end homelessness in Will County. Acts as the medium between consumers of homeless services and CoC; reaches out to consumers and represents their needs to the CoC; advocates for the needs of consumers in the community; networks within the community and with other communities and provide and receive information on best practices and innovative solutions toward preventing and ending homelessness; and by being a resource for and advising other CoC committees in regard to their roles and tasks within the CoC.

The FY 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and FY 2015 Annual Action Plan have many components that require and encourage citizen participation. These components are the following: requests for proposals (RFP's) for CDBG and HOME funding from agencies/organizations; meetings with agencies/organizations on how to complete the RFP; interviews and roundtable discussions with various stakeholders; a public needs hearing; and a public hearing to gather comments on the draft plan on public display. The City also developed a survey to obtain resident input. The Survey was made available in an online version on the City's website and in a hard copy version available in City Hall. Spanish language versions of both the online and hard copy surveys were made available in accordance with the City of Joliet's Citizen Participation Plan. The City received 548 completed surveys. All of these comments are included in the consolidated and annual action plan in the Exhibit Section. Through the citizen participation process, the City uses citizen input to develop how the plan will serve the low- and moderate-income population to reach the goals set forth in the Five Year Consolidated Plan.

The City also held 2 publicly advertised land use and legislative meetings and did a press release in Spanish and English to draw attention to the Consolidated Plan and draft display.

Needs Assessment Overview

The City of Joliet used the HUD Comprehensive Housing Affordability Strategy (CHAS) data, which provides statistical data on housing needs, to prepare its estimates and projects. The tables in this section have been pre-populated with HUD data sets based on the American Community Survey (ACS) five year estimates, and the 2010 U.S. Census. This data is the most current information available to assess housing needs, homeless needs, special needs, social service needs, economic development needs, etc.

Joliet is part of the Joliet/Bolingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care. Data for the development for the homeless needs section was obtained from the County Continuum of Care.

Additional needs for the City of Joliet were obtained from input and interviews with various social service agencies, housing providers, city staff, and survey responses.

NA-10 Housing Needs Assessment - 24 CFR 91.205 (a,b,c)

Summary of Housing Needs

Based on a comparison between the 2000 and 2011 population, the City of Joliet had a 38% increase in its population. The total population increase was 40,599 persons living in 46,831 households. It should be noted that single person households are the fastest growing household type. Furthermore, the median income of the area increased by 27%. This increase in median income represents a change in nominal dollars and not a change in real dollars. In order to calculate the change in real dollars, the Consumer Price Index is used to calculate the inflation rate for a given period. Between 2000 and 2011, the cumulative inflation rate was 30.6%, meaning that the \$47,761.00 median income in 2000 would be \$62,388.57 if it were expressed in 2011 dollars. By taking into consideration the rate of inflation, the median income in Joliet has not kept up with the rate of inflation.

Describe the number and type of single person households in need of housing assistance.

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey (ACS), there were 143,747 households in 2011 in the City of Joliet. Based on this number of households, 31,337 (21.8%) of all households were single person households living alone. Single person households aged 65 and over comprised 10,206 households or (7.1%) of all single person households. Based on the ACS estimates, 32.6% of all persons living alone are seniors, and it is presumed that as they age in place, additional accommodations and supportive services will be necessary for this portion of the City’s population. The City will need to assist in obtaining funding and collaborating with housing service and elderly support agencies to provide programs, activities and accommodations for its elderly population.

Estimate the number and type of families in need of housing assistance who are disabled or victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking.

Disabled Population – Based on the 2000 CHAS Data and the 2007-2011 ACS Data, it is estimated that 46.7% of all disabled renters have a housing problem that includes cost overburdened by 30% or another type of housing problem, and 33.5% of disabled homeowners have a housing problem that includes cost overburdened by 30% or another type of housing problem. From these estimates it can be deduced that approximately 2,430 disabled renters have a housing problem and approximately 6,120 disabled homeowners have a housing problem. A breakdown of the types of disability as a percent of the entire population of Joliet is as follows: hearing difficulty = 2.04%; vision difficulty = 1.77%; cognitive difficulty = 3.45%; ambulatory difficulty = 4.67%; self-care difficulty = 1.97%; and independent living difficulty = 3.45%.

Victims of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, sexual assault, and stalking – Based on the local crime statistics and social service agency responses to interviews and surveys, it is estimated that approximately 50 single family households and family households that are victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking, are in need of housing assistance.

What are the most common housing problems?

The largest housing problem in the City of Joliet is affordability. According to the 2007-2011 ACS data, 51% of all renter households are cost overburdened by 30% or more, and 20.6% of all owner households are cost overburdened by 30% or more.

In consultations, interviews and surveys, the lack of affordable accessible housing for the disabled is the largest unmet housing need and problem. The housing stock is older and most single family residential structures are two stories in height and therefore are not accessible.

Another housing issue is the lack of permanent supportive housing for the homeless.

Are any populations/household types more affected than others by these problems?

Yes, the elderly and disabled populations are the most affected by the high cost of housing in the City of Joliet. The elderly and disabled are on fixed or limited incomes. Even though Joliet is the most affordable housing market in Will County, there is a lack of affordable housing that is decent, safe, and sound for the very low income residents.

Another group affected by the lack of affordable housing is the homeless and persons at-risk of becoming homeless, including persons who are victims of domestic violence.

The City of Joliet does not receive an ESG entitlement grant for the local shelter activities. However, funding is provided by the State to the following agencies:

- Daybreak Center
- MorningStar Mission Ministries Inc.

Specific needs of the extremely low-income who are housed, but are facing an imminent risk of becoming unsheltered, or are living in shelters consist of: food, clothing, transportation and job training. The local social service agencies provide food and clothing through food pantries, food kitchens and thrift stores. Transportation and job training are limited and funds are needed to address those needs.

The local organizations maintain records in the HMIS system and continue to monitor and tract assisted households. The HMIS reports indicate that only a small percentage of assisted clients return to homelessness after twelve (12) months of service.

The Joliet/Bolingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care does not provide estimates of the at-risk population. This information is not available.

Specify particular housing characteristics that have been linked with instability and an increased risk of homelessness

The high cost of decent, safe, and sanitary housing in the area creates instability and an increased risk of homelessness for lower income families in the area. Many families are living from paycheck to paycheck and are paying over 30% of their income for housing.

The other housing characteristic that adds to the instability is the lack of housing educational services. For example, residents need to be aware of predatory lending practices, the risk of purchasing a house through a "land contract," the lack of knowledge on home maintenance, and financial planning and management of money for the operation of a home. The Joliet/Bolingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care provides job training services to the unemployed and underemployed.

Discussion

The City of Joliet's population is growing. However, the population growth is mainly in the lower income single person household category. This puts a strain on the local housing market and creates a shortage of decent, safe and sound housing that is affordable to very low income persons.

Another housing initiative is the acquisition of Evergreen Terrace by the City of Joliet. The City condemned the property and through a lengthy court battle and final agreement with HUD the City will be acquiring the property. This is a large scale development of affordable housing that needs to be completely rehabilitated. The Court has awarded the owners a value for the property and the City will pay the value using pervious years' CDBG funds, FY 2015 CDBG funds, and a potential Section 108 Loan or City bond issue. Plans for the redevelopment of the site are being prepared. Preliminary designs include some demolition of existing buildings, rehabilitation of other housing units, construction of a community center and an open park/recreational facility.

The greatest housing problem facing the City of Joliet, IL is the lack of affordable housing and the fact that many of the City’s lower income households are paying more than 30% of their total household income on housing related costs. The following information was noted: 6,195 White households were cost overburdened by 30% to 50%, and 3,070 White households were cost overburdened by greater than 50%; 1,640 Black/African American households were cost overburdened by 30% to 50%, and 1,820 Black/African American households were cost overburdened by greater than 50%; and lastly, 2,190 Hispanic households were cost overburdened by 30% to 50%, and 1,525 Hispanic households were cost overburdened by greater than 50%.

Discussion:

A total of 6,195 White households were considered cost overburdened by between 30% and 50%, which is 59.4% of the total cases of households that were considered cost overburdened. This number is below the 73.21% of total households the White category comprises. A total of 1,640 Black/African American households were considered cost overburdened by between 30% and 50%, which is 15.7% of the total

cases of households that were considered cost overburdened. This number is below the 16.4% of total households the Black/African American category comprises. A total of 2,190 Hispanic households were considered cost overburdened by between 30% and 50%, which is 21% of the total cases of households that were considered cost overburdened. This number is slightly above the 19.46% of total households in the Hispanic category.

A total of 3,070 White households were considered cost overburdened by greater than 50%, which is 46% of the total cases of households that were considered cost overburdened. This number is below the 73.21% of total households the White category comprises. A total of 1,820 Black/African American households were considered cost overburdened by greater than 50%, which is 27.29% of the total cases of households that were considered cost overburdened. This number is 10.89% higher the 16.4% of total households the Black/African American category comprises. This indicated that this category of the population is disproportionately cost overburdened. A total of 1,525 Hispanic households were considered cost overburdened by greater than 50%, which is 22.8% of the total cases of households that were considered cost overburdened. This number is slightly above the 19.46% of total households the Hispanic category comprises.

There are three (3) disproportionately impacted group in terms of having a severe housing problem: the 0-30% AMI Black/African American group, the 30-50% AMI Hispanic/Latino group, the 50-80% AMI Hispanic/Latino group, and the 80-100% AMI Hispanic group.

There is one disproportionately impacted group in terms of having a housing cost burden: the greater than 50% Black/African American group.

The most recent data available on the concentration of racial or ethnic groups is the 2010 U.S. Census data. According to this data, the City of Joliet has a minority population of 32.5% of its total population. The City uses the definition of an Area of Minority Concentration as a Census Tract or Block Group where at least 50% of the population who reside in that area are identified as being a minority person. Based on this definition there are eight (8) Census Tracts (or partial Census Tracts) in the City with a percentage of minority persons over 50%: Census Tract 8812; Census Tract 8816.03; Census Tract 8819; Census Tract 8820; Census Tract 8824; Census Tract 8825; Census Tract 8826.02; and Census Tract 8831.

NA-35 Public Housing – 91.205(b)

Introduction

The Housing Authority of Joliet is the public housing agency that serves the City of Joliet, as well as Will County, Illinois. The Housing Authority owns and manages 989 units of public housing, of which 303 units are elderly. In addition, the Housing Authority administers 1,316 Housing Choice Vouchers. According to the Housing Authority of Joliet's Five Year Plan for the period of 2010 - 2014, the goals of the Housing Authority are as follows:

Expand the supply of assisted housing

- Apply for additional rental vouchers to meet the needs of families, senior citizens and the disabled population.
- Reduce public housing vacancies.
- Leverage private or other public funds to create additional housing opportunities.
- Acquire or build units or developments.

Improve the quality of assisted housing

- Improve public housing management.
- Improve voucher management.
- Increase customer satisfaction.
- Concentrate on efforts to improve specific management functions.
- Renovate or modernize public housing units.
- The Authority is evaluating the feasibility of a twenty (20) year contract that will include supplemental energy efficiency improvements.
- Demolish or dispose of obsolete public housing.
- Provide replacement public housing.
- Provide replacement vouchers.

Provide voucher mobility counseling

- Conduct outreach efforts to potential voucher landlords.

PHA Goal: Provide an improved living environment

- Implement measures to de-concentrate poverty by bringing higher income public housing households into lower income developments.
- Implement measures to promote income mixing in public housing by assuring access for lower income families into higher income developments.
- Implement public housing security improvements.

Promote self-sufficiency and asset development of assisted households

- Increase the number and percentage of employed persons with assisted families.
- Provide or attract supportive services to improve assistance recipient's employability.
- Provide or attract supportive services to increase independence for the elderly or families with disabilities
- Provide training and job placement to low income Will County residents, including public housing and Section 8 voucher holders through the Authority's Step-Up Program.
- Provide training and job placement to low income Will County residents, including public housing and Section 8 voucher holders through the Authority's Expanded Step-Up Program.

Ensure equal opportunity and affirmatively further fair housing

- Undertake affirmative measures to ensure access to assisted housing regardless of race, color, region, national origin, sex, familial status, and disability.
- Undertake affirmative measures to provide a suitable living environment for families living in assisted housing, regardless of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, familial status, and disability.
- Undertake affirmative measures to ensure accessible housing to persons with all varieties of disabilities regardless of unit size required.

Section 504 Needs Assessment: Describe the needs of public housing tenants and applicants on the waiting list for accessible units:

The Housing Authority has on 5,966 households on its county-wide Public Housing Program waiting list. The following housing needs are for the applicants on the waiting list for public housing:

- **One Bedroom Apartments** = 2,598
- **Two Bedroom Apartments** = 1,827
- **Three Bedroom Apartments** = 1,178
- **Four Bedroom Apartments** = 275
- **Five Bedroom Apartments** = 88

The waiting list for Housing Choice Vouchers (1,374 families/individuals) is mainly for families with children.

There is a need for accessible housing accommodations for the elderly applicants on the waiting list. It is estimated that approximately 12.19% of the persons on the waiting list (727 persons) are in need of accessibility accommodations.

In 1992 the Housing Authority of Joliet developed a Section 504 Transition Plan to address the need for mobility and sight/hearing accessible rental units; 106 rental units were brought into compliance.

In 2011, the Housing Authority of Joliet conducted a second study relative to ADA compliance. Deficiencies were identified and the Housing Authority anticipates it will begin implementing compliance measures over the next two year period.

Most immediate needs of residents of Public Housing and Housing Choice voucher holders

The most immediate needs of Public Housing residents is for employment training, job opportunities, and transportation for shopping and medical services. The Public Housing Authority is providing training through its Step-up to Work Program.

The immediate needs of Housing Choice Voucher holders is similar. In addition, they need housing units that are located close to public transportation or their place of employment.

For Public Housing residents and Housing Choice Voucher holders, as well as those on the waiting list, the supply of available affordable units provided by the Housing Authority of Joliet is limited thus creating a shortage of affordable housing choices.

How do these needs compare to the housing needs of the population at large

The needs of the existing public housing residents and Housing Choice Voucher Holders are not similar to the population at large which has a much higher income. Those residents are living in decent, safe, and sanitary housing that is affordable to them since they are in a higher income bracket. However, the needs of individuals not residents of Public Housing or Housing Choice voucher holders but who are very low income, are similar.

Even though Joliet is the most affordable housing market in Will County, there is a lack of housing that is decent, safe, sound, and affordable for the very low income residents.

Discussion

The Housing Authority of Joliet is a partner with the City in addressing the housing needs for the residents of Joliet who are very low and extremely low income. The City of Joliet has identified the need for affordable housing that is decent, safe, and sound. The Housing Authority is a valuable resource in addressing that need. There is a significant number of households in the City that are at or below 50% of AMI that are affected by housing problems, severe housing problems and housing cost burdens.

NA-40 Homeless Needs Assessment – 91.205(c)

Introduction:

The Joliet/Blingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care (CoC) is the countywide organization that was formed to address the needs of the homeless in Will County. The City of Joliet is a member of the Continuum of Care. The Continuum of Care is administered by the Will County Center for Community Concerns. The City's Director of Neighborhood Services sits on the CoC Leadership Committee as the Vice-Chair and acts as the City's representative. The City coordinates its activities with the Continuum of Care and supports its applications for funding. The City helps the Will County CoC to address homelessness by working together to develop a network of supportive housing and services for the homeless.

Members of the CoC include the Housing Authority of Joliet, representatives of the City's Department of Community Development, social service agencies, shelter providers, housing providers, and the local representation of the IL Department of Employment Security. Services are provided to homeless individuals and families through the HMIS case management system. Case managers work directly with the clients to identify the specific needs and challenges facing the homeless. Case managers act as the primary mechanism for supportive services and housing for homeless individuals and families.

Estimate the number and type of families in need of housing assistance for families with children and the families of veterans.

Based on the information provided from members of the Joliet/Bolingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care, it is estimated that 45 (there are 82 children listed as homeless. None of them are unsheltered) families with children and 20 families of Veterans are in need of housing assistance.

Describe the Nature and Extent of Homelessness by Racial and Ethnic Group.

A total of 153 Black/African American individuals are experiencing some type of homelessness within Will County. This compares to 145 individuals identifying as White and 23 individuals who identify as Hispanic/Latino.

Describe the Nature and Extent of Unsheltered and Sheltered Homelessness.

There is a need for both shelter and unsheltered facilities. There is a greater number of sheltered single persons without children than families who are homeless.

Discussion:

The City of Joliet provides a wide range of services to homeless individuals throughout the City and surrounding region. The City is conveniently located on the end of the train line from Chicago, making it accessible to the homeless throughout the region. This accessibility, combined with the wide-variety of services, makes the City of Joliet an attractive place for homeless to travel to. The homeless population of Joliet is growing and there is a lack of Federal funds to develop additional beds and permanent housing for the homeless.

NA-45 Non-Homeless Special Needs Assessment - 91.205 (b,d)

Introduction:

The assessment of non-homeless special needs includes the following:

- Elderly persons (age 65 years and older)
- Frail elderly
- Persons with mental, physical and/or developmental disabilities
- Persons with alcohol or other drug additions
- Persons with HIV/AIDS and their families
- Victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking

The housing need of each of these groups were determined by consultation with social service providers and statistical information provided by social services providers.

Describe the characteristics of special needs populations in your community:

Elderly Persons are defined as persons who are age 62 years and older. According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey Data, elderly persons represent 10.2% of the City's total population. Approximately 24.3% of the elderly population are age 80 years and older. In addition, roughly 70% of the total elderly population lives alone as a single person household.

Frail Elderly are those persons who are elderly and have a form of disability, ranging from a hearing loss, vision difficulty, cognitive difficulty, ambulatory problems, and lack of self-help skills. It is estimated that approximately 21% of the total elderly population are frail elderly.

Persons with mental, physical and development and disabilities, according to the ACS data for 2007-2011, comprise 8.9% (12,936 persons) of the City of Joliet's total population and are classified as "disabled."

Persons with HIV/AIDS and their families comprise a small percentage of the City's overall population. According to the Illinois Department of Public Health, HIV/AIDS Surveillance Unit, between 2006 and 2013, the rate of HIV diagnosis per 100,000 was 5.4. The rate of AIDS cases during that time period was 2.9. There are 672 Living HIV/AIDS cases in the County. Males are disproportionately affected and the HIV/AIDS population is still growing in numbers.

Victims of Domestic Violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking is rapidly increasing both locally and nationally. Based on crime statistics and social service agency response, it can be estimated

that approximately 50 single person households and family households are victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking.

What are the housing and supportive service needs of these populations and how are these needs determined?

Based on the current HUD-CHAS Data, interviews with housing agencies and social service providers, the following housing and supportive service needs were determined:

- Elderly Persons – 307 housing units plus supportive services
- Frail Elderly – 64 housing units plus supportive services
- Mentally, Physically Disabled – 550 housing units plus supportive services
- Alcohol & Drug Addicts – 25 housing units plus supportive services
- HIV/AIDS Persons – 10 housing units plus supportive services
- Victims of Domestic Violence – 10 housing units plus supportive services

Discuss the size and characteristics of the population with HIV/AIDS and their families within the Eligible Metropolitan Statistical Area:

By December 2013 it is estimated that there are a total of 672 individuals diagnosed with HIV/AIDS in Will County. There are no statistics available for the Metropolitan Statistical Area.

Discussion:

The needs for these various groups of the Special Needs Population are only estimates, based on HUD data, U.S. Census Data, ACS data and interviews with housing providers and social service agencies. Accurate statistics are not available for all of these groups, so therefore “best estimates” are presented.

While many supportive service providers for the special needs population are located in the City of Joliet, their service area and clients are in the Will County region. Therefore, the statistics are not limited to just the City of Joliet.

Describe the jurisdiction’s need for Public Facilities:

The following are the needs for improvement to the City’s public facilities:

- Public facilities need to be ADA compliant in accordance with City Ordinances.
- Public facilities need to be in compliance with the City Ordinances.
- Public facilities must be open and available to all residents of the City on a fair and impartial basis.
- Public facilities need to be provided by the City to maintain a quality of life for its residents.
- Public facilities must be improved and expanded to meet the increase in the growing population of the City and County.

How were these needs determined?

These needs for public facilities were determined through the resident survey, interviews with City staff, public hearing comments on needs, and the City’s Comprehensive Plan.

Describe the jurisdiction’s need for Public Improvements:

The following are the City’s need for public improvements:

- The City needs to improve and upgrade its storm water management and separation of storm and sanitary sewers.
- The City needs to reconstruct and improve its roads, curbs, and walks, especially in the oldest portions of the City.
- The City needs to provide for additional handicap accessibility at intersections, public buildings and facilities.
- The City needs to improve and upgrade its sanitary sewer system.
- The City needs to improve and upgrade its water lines and distribution system.
- The City needs to improve its parks and playground equipment.

How were these needs determined?

These needs for public improvements were determined through interviews with the City staff and department heads and the City’s Comprehensive Plan.

Describe the jurisdiction's need for Public Services:

The City of Joliet provides for public safety and other public services to its residents. The following are the City's need for public services:

- The City needs to continue to provide fire protection to its residents at the same high level of service.
- The City needs to upgrade its fire stations and fire safety equipment and vehicles.
- The City needs to continue to provide its high level of public safety to its residents.
- The City needs to provide neighborhood policing in areas with high levels of crime.
- The City needs to continue its code enforcement efforts to ensure the health and safety of its residents.
- The City needs to continue to provide garbage, trash pickup, and neighborhood clean-up programs to its residents.
- The City needs to continue to support its recycling program.
- The City needs to support, encourage, and affirmatively further fair housing throughout its neighborhoods.

How were these needs determined?

The City's public service needs were determined through meetings and interviews with the Police Department, Fire Department, Code Office, City Manager, public hearings, resident surveys, and other City Staff.

Housing Market Analysis

MA-05 Overview

Housing Market Analysis Overview:

The City of Joliet is an older, well established city in Chicago's outer-ring of suburbs. The City has been experiencing growth in its housing stock as a result of an increase in its population. Joliet has become a very desirable place to live based on the reasonable cost of housing, the variety of housing types, and its proximity to the Chicago employment "hub". There is good transportation access to Chicago via the Interstate highways and train service.

Approximately one-quarter (25.1%) of all the occupied housing units were built before 1950, which is over 60 years ago. Between 2000 and 2009 there was a housing "boom" in the City with 12,775 (25.1%) units built.

According to 2007-2011 American Community Survey Data, the City now has 34,666 owner-occupied housing units (74.0% of all occupied housing units) and 12,165 renter-occupied housing units (26.0% of all occupied housing units).

The condition of the housing stock is fairly sound. The owner-occupied houses are well maintained, and through the City's Code Enforcement efforts, the City is bringing the rental housing units up to code standards. According to the ACS data for 2007-2011, there are 3,690 vacant housing units in the City, which is approximately 7.3% of all the housing units. This is slightly higher than the housing vacancy rate of Will County which is 6.1% but less than the statewide vacancy rate of 9.7%.

The median home value as of 2011 was \$188,700 and the median contract rent was \$833/month for the same time period.

MA-10 Number of Housing Units – 91.210(a)&(b)(2)

Introduction

According to the 2007-2011 ACS data, there are 50,803 total housing units. There are 46,831 occupied housing units (34,666 owner-occupied and 12,165 renter-occupied), which leaves 7.3% vacant housing units. The majority of the owner-occupied housing are 3 or more bedrooms (79% of all owner-occupied houses). The majority (64%) of all renter-occupied housing units are 1 to 2 bedrooms.

Describe the number and targeting (income level/type of family served) of units assisted with federal, state, and local programs.

The following number of units in the City of Joliet that are assisted with Federal, State and Local Programs is as follows:

- **Public Housing** - 989 housing units of which 687 are elderly units and 302 are family units. The income levels are at 80% and below AMI.

- **Housing Choice Vouchers** - 1,316 vouchers that are tenant based and 15 are Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH). The income levels are at 80% and below AMI.
- **First Time Home Buyers** - The City has assisted 59 households with downpayment assistance to purchase a home since 2002. The income levels are at 80% AMI or below.
- **Habitat for Humanity** - has built 8 new homes in Joliet with City HOME funds. The income level is at 50% and below AMI.
- **LIHTC Housing** – There are 4 LIHTC housing developments in the City with a total of 352 units.

Provide an assessment of units expected to be lost from the affordable housing inventory for any reason, such as expiration of Section 8 contracts.

There are no affordable housing units that are anticipated that will be lost and there are no Section 8 Contracts that are anticipated to expire.

Does the availability of housing units meet the needs of the population?

There is a sufficient supply of housing units by various types within the City of Joliet. There are 34,666 owner-occupied housing units, 12,165 renter-occupied housing units, and approximately 3,690 vacant units. Of the vacant units, approximately 1,026 (27.8%) are for rent and 558 (15.1%) are for sale. The problem is not the “availability” of units in the City of Joliet, it is the “affordability” of units in the City.

Describe the need for specific types of housing:

The elderly population of the City of Joliet (age 62 and above) is 14,986 persons which represents 10.2% of the total City’s population. However, there are 1,402 assisted rental housing units for the elderly out of a total of 12,165 renter-occupied housing units which is 12% of the renter-occupied units. As the City’s population ages in place, there will be less available elderly units and a higher demand for those units. It is estimated that 307 new affordable housing units for the elderly are needed. There is also a lack of “accessible” housing units in the City to address the needs of the physically disabled. Not including elderly housing units, it appears that there is a need for 550 housing units that are accessible to persons with physical disabilities.

Discussion

There is a continuing need for “affordable” and “accessible” housing in the City of Joliet. The existing housing is sound and there appears to be an adequate supply of market-rate housing. The City has a growing population, and new construction and rehabilitation work is increasing again as evidenced by the number of building and renovation permits issued by the City. The housing market is stable in the City and Will County. Real estate values continue to rise and the City of Joliet is a good place to live.

MA-15 Housing Market Analysis: Cost of Housing - 91.210(a)

Introduction

The value of housing value has fluctuated throughout the last 10 years; peaking around 2007 and steadily declining since. According to Trulia’s website on the housing market in Joliet, the median sales price in recent months is just over \$110,000. In 2000, based on the 2000 U.S. Census, the median home value was \$116,600 which has increased to \$188,700 according to the 2007-2011 ACS data. An increase in the median contract rent (from the same sources) also occurred. Median rent rose from \$487/month to \$706/month. Over half (65.6%) of all rental housing units were in the \$500 to \$999 category per month.

According to Trulia.com there were roughly 200 housing units sold in June 2014. They reported that the medium sales price was \$110,000. There are 619 houses that are active on the market. The website also reported that, “Average price per square foot for Joliet IL was \$86, an increase of 3.6% compared to the same period last year. The median sales price for homes in Joliet IL for November 2014 to February 2015 was \$110,000 based on 236 home sales. Compared to the same period one year ago, the median home sales price increased 4.8%, or \$5,000, and the number of home sales decreased 15.4%. There are currently 619 resale and new homes in Joliet on Trulia, including 5 open houses, as well as 1,071 homes in the pre-foreclosure, auction, or bank-owned stages of the foreclosure process. The average listing price for homes for sale in Joliet IL was \$170,132 for the week ending February 18, 2015, which represents an increase of 4.4%, or \$7,153, compared to the prior week. Popular neighborhoods in Joliet include Cathedral Area and Reedwood, with average listing prices of \$151,779 and \$111,265.”

In regard to housing affordability, 4,510 renter housing units were affordable to persons with 50% or less of their Housing Affordability Median Family Income (HAMFI). For home owners, there were only 1,535 housing units that were affordable to households with 50% or less HAMFI.

The monthly FMR’s for Joliet are within the HUD HOME Rents range (between High and Low HOME Rents) for efficiency apartments, one (1) bedroom apartments, and two (2) bedroom apartments. The monthly FMR for Joliet was the same as the High HUD HOME rent value for a three (3) bedroom apartment. For a four (4) bedroom apartment, the monthly FMR for Joliet is higher than the High HUD HOME rent value. In 2013, the median rent was \$872 and rose significantly to \$1,200 in 2014.

Is there sufficient housing for households at all income levels?

Based on the HUD - CHAS data there is not sufficient housing for all income levels due to the cost over burden criteria for the following group: Greater than 50% AMI Black/African American households.

How is affordability of housing likely to change considering changes to home values and/or rents?

With an increasing population and an increasing number of households, the demand for housing will increase in the City of Joliet. This increase in demand is accompanied by an increase in home values. Housing affordability is likely to increase if this trend continues.

How do HOME rents / Fair Market Rent compare to Area Median Rent? How might this impact your strategy to produce or preserve affordable housing?

According to “Rentometer,” it is estimated that the area’s median rent for a one-bedroom unit is \$635, and \$765 for a two-bedroom unit. The monthly FMR’s for Joliet are within the HUD HOME Rents range (between High and Low HOME Rents) for efficiency apartments, one (1) bedroom apartments, and two (2) bedroom apartments. The monthly FMR for Joliet was the same as the High HUD HOME rent value for a three (3) bedroom apartment. For a four (4) bedroom apartment, the monthly FMR for Joliet is higher than the High HUD HOME rent value. There is a disparity of approximately \$200 per month between the HUD FMR and the current real estate market rents.

This difference would suggest that the HUD HOME rent values have not yet caught up to the Joliet housing and rental market. Landlords using those numbers are likely charging above market rates. These low market rates make housing more affordable in the City of Joliet.

Discussion

Housing values (both rent and real estate values) have decreased despite the increasing population in the City of Joliet. This decrease in the cost of housing makes housing more affordable in Joliet, but it also reduces the equity and financial leverage homeowners have from their homes.

MA-20 Housing Market Analysis: Condition of Housing – 91.210(a)

Introduction

The City of Joliet contains 10,695 housing units which were built prior to 1950. This represents 22.8% of the total occupied housing units in the City. 25.6% of all occupied housing units were built within the last ten years. Of the 46,831 total housing units in the City, 19,135 (41%) housing units have at least one "selected condition." In addition, 24,204 housing units were built before 1980, and therefore have a potential lead-based paint hazard.

Definitions

The following definitions are used in the table below:

"Selected Housing Condition" - Over-crowding (1.01 or more persons per room), lacking a complete kitchen, lack of plumbing facilities, and/or other utilities, and cost over-burden.

"Substandard condition" - Does not meet code standards, or contains one of the selected housing conditions.

"Suitable for Rehabilitation" - The amount of work required to bring the unit up to minimum code standard, and the existing debt on the property, together are less than the fair market value of the property.

"Not Suitable for Rehabilitation" - The amount of work required to bring the unit up to minimum code standard exceeds the fair market value of the property after rehabilitation work is complete.

Need for Owner and Rental Rehabilitation

It is estimated that there are approximately 3,640 housing units that are suitable for rehabilitation work in the City of Joliet. However, the cost of rehabilitation exceeds the income and assets of many low- and moderate-income persons. Therefore, many of these housing units will remain vacant since the financial resources are not available to rehabilitate the housing units. There is a need for increased Federal funds to provide financial assistance to lower income families to rehabilitate properties for more affordable housing.

Estimated Number of Housing Units Occupied by Low or Moderate Income Families with LBP Hazards

In determining decent, safe, and sound housing conditions, one needs to look at the environmental quality of these housing units. Lead based paint is one of the most significant environmental factors negatively affecting residential housing units. In 1978, lead was banned from residential paint; more than half of the total housing stock in the United States contains some lead based paint. It is estimated that 20 million housing units contain lead hazards, which include flaking or peeling lead based paint and excessive levels of tiny lead particles in household dust.

HUD estimates that 3.8 million homes containing such immediate lead hazards are occupied by families with young children who are at immediate risk of lead poisoning. Half of these families own their homes and of those, half have incomes above \$30,000 per year.

Lead-based paint in residential housing can cause severe health risks for children. HUD provides a general formula to estimate the potential presence of lead-based paint (LBP) in housing built prior to 1979, before lead based paint was banned in the United States.

For the City of Joliet it is estimated that 54% of low or moderate income families living in owner-occupied units are at risk of lead-based paint hazards and that 27% of low or moderate income families living in rental units are at risk of lead-based paint hazards.

Discussion

The reported cases of childhood lead poisoning in Will County are low. State Health Department estimates emphasize that the number of unreported/undetected cases of childhood lead poisoning is unknown, and the low number of reported cases should not be misconstrued as evidence that lead poisoning is not more widespread.

The revised Federal lead-based paint regulations published on September 15, 1999 (24 CFR Part 35) have had a significant impact on many activities – rehabilitation, tenant based rental assistance, and property acquisition – supported by the CDBG program. The City of Joliet will comply with Title 24 Part 35: Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention in Certain Residential Structures (Current Rule).

Rehabilitation Programs:

The City of Joliet will continue to ensure that:

- Applicants for rehabilitation funding receive the required lead-based paint information and understand their responsibilities.
- Staff properly determines whether proposed projects are exempt from some or all lead-based paint requirements.

- The level of federal rehabilitation assistance is properly calculated and the applicable lead-based paint requirements determined.
- Properly qualified personnel perform risk management, paint testing, lead hazard reduction, and clearance services when required.
- Required lead hazard reduction work and protective measures are incorporated into project rehabilitation specifications.
- Risk assessment, paint testing, lead hazard reduction, and clearance work are performed in accordance with the applicable standards established in 24 CFR Part 35.
- Required notices regarding lead-based paint evaluation, presumption, and hazard reduction are provided to occupants and documented.
- Program documents establish the rental property owner's responsibility to perform and document ongoing lead-based paint maintenance activities, when applicable.
- Program staff monitors owner compliance with ongoing lead-based paint maintenance activities, when applicable.

Homeownership Programs:

The City of Joliet will continue to ensure that:

- Applicants for homeownership assistance receive adequate information about lead-based paint requirements.
- Staff properly determines whether proposed projects are exempt from some or all lead based paint requirements.
- A proper visual assessment is performed to identify deteriorated paint in the dwelling unit, any common areas servicing the unit, and exterior surfaces of the building or soil.
- Prior to occupancy, properly qualified personnel perform paint stabilization and the dwelling passes a clearance exam in accordance with the standards established in 24 CFR Part 35.
- The home purchaser receives the required lead-based paint pamphlet and notices.

MA-25 Public and Assisted Housing – 91.210(b)

Introduction

The Housing Authority of Joliet owns and operates 7 public housing communities. There are a total of 991 housing units in the public housing communities. Roughly two thirds of the public housing units are reserved for the elderly.

In addition, the Housing Authority administers 1,190 Housing Choice Vouchers for low- to moderate-income households for rental units in the City and surrounding region. There are 268 Family Unification Program Vouchers and 388 Disabled Vouchers included in that total.

The housing units are 100% occupied with a waiting list of over 4,000 families. There is a slow turn-over of units. For each open unit of housing, there are ten (10) applicants; of which 60% are rejected for a variety of reasons including criminal history, family size, income eligibility, etc.

Describe the restoration and revitalization needs of public housing units in the jurisdiction:

Of the public housing units owned by the Housing Authority of Joliet, roughly 330 units are considered “functionally obsolete.” These units are primarily rented to families.

There is a need for rehabilitation funds to be used by the Housing Authority to make the public housing units in the City of Joliet decent, safe, and accessible.

Describe the public housing agency's strategy for improving the living environment of low- and moderate-income families residing in public housing:

In its Five Year Plan for the period of 2010 – 2014 the Housing Authority of Joliet has developed the following strategies for improving the living environment for its public housing residents:

- Improve public housing management.
- Improve voucher management.
- Increase customer satisfaction.
- Concentrate on efforts to improve specific management functions.
- Renovate or modernize public housing units.
- Improve energy performance.
- Demolish or dispose of obsolete public housing.
- Provide replacement public housing.
- Provide replacement vouchers.

Discussion:

The Housing Authority of Joliet is going in a new direction to address the affordable housing needs of the City. The Housing Authority used the Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) financing model to develop Liberty Meadows, a 188 mixed income town house community in the City. The project started

in 2007 and Phases I and II are now completed. The Housing Authority owns approximately 64 acres of land and will construct Phase III town houses and a 3,000 square foot community center. There are 66 assisted rental units in the development with 218 assisted bedrooms. This type of housing development will help the City to meet the needs of its lower income residents by providing more affordable housing.

Introduction

The City of Joliet is part of the Joliet/Bollingbrook/Will County Continuum of Care. In the City of Joliet, the CoC works to provide an adequate level of care to the increasing number of homeless in the City. These efforts are carried out by the City of Joliet, the Will County Center for Community Concerns (the administrator of the Will County Continuum of Care), Will County, and various social service organizations operating within the City of Joliet.

There are several mainstream services available to the homeless in the City of Joliet including the following:

- **Health Care** - Aunt Martha's and "Daybreak Emergency Shelter" operated by Catholic Charities Inc.
- **Mental Health Services** – Will County Health Department
- **Social Services** – Daybreak Emergency Shelter, Morningstar Mission, Forest Park Community Center, Unity CDC, Mt. Zion Baptist Church, and Church of God in Christ.
- **Educational** – Joliet Junior College, Forest Park Community Center, Aunt Martha's Youth Service Center
- **Rental Assistance** – Hines VA Center, ILDHS/DMH
- **Shelter** – Daybreak Emergency Shelter and Morningstar Mission

List and describe services and facilities that meet the needs of homeless persons, particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth. If the services and facilities are listed on screen SP-40 Institutional Delivery Structure or screen MA-35 Special Needs Facilities and Services, describe how these facilities and services specifically address the needs of these populations.

No unaccompanied youth were identified in recent PIT counts. The CoC participates in the Child and Adolescent Local Area Network (LAN) #49 that coordinates efforts of providers serving children and adolescents. A "wraparound process" is engaged to address all the needs of youth and provide crisis prevention/response individually. Aunt Martha's Youth Service Center offers public education, provider training, case management, referral and linkage, transportation assistance, housing search and placement, consumer education, budget counseling, and cash assistance for qualified homeless youth aged 18-24. Aunt Martha's works directly with the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services to provide services when a ward of the state has been identified aged 16-17. The Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) contracts Screening, Assessment, and Support Service (SASS) agencies for youth that may be in need of mental health services, provided through the Will County Health Department.

The CoC works with the Veterans Assistance Commission of Will County that provides interim/emergency financial assistance; advocacy services in applying to agencies to procure benefits; works closely with all veteran organizations, utility companies, landlords, local, state and Federal agencies to ensure the rights and benefits to which each veteran is entitled; and provides assistance with filing claims to the VA. The HUD/VASH Program Coordinator for the Hines VA Center joined the CoC in 2011 to coordinate services and Hines opened a clinic in 2013 in Joliet to provide additional health and support services. Transitional housing for veterans is provided by Family and Friends (GPD) and MorningStar Ministries. Permanent supportive housing is provided through Cornerstone Services and

Catholic Charities (SHP). Catholic Charities and Midwest Shelter for Homeless Veterans provide services through the SSVF in Joliet.

MA-35 Special Needs Facilities and Services – 91.210(d)

Introduction

The City of Joliet has identified the priorities for services and facilities for its special needs population. This includes the elderly, frail elderly, persons with disabilities, persons with alcohol or other drug addictions, persons with HIV/AIDS and their families, and public housing residents.

- **Public Housing Residents** - housing downpayment assistance, job training and job opportunities, housing counseling for home ownership, and assistance in finding affordable housing
- **Victims of Domestic Violence** - additional temporary shelters, supportive services and training programs, and permanent supportive housing options

Describe programs for ensuring that persons returning from mental and physical health institutions receive appropriate supportive housing

The City of Joliet will coordinate efforts with the IL Department of Human Services (DHS) to ensure that persons returning from mental and physical health institutions have an individual supportive services plan. This includes housing, training/educational, employment and other supportive services needed for a smooth transition back into society. A case manager from the IL DHS is assigned to each client. The local social service agencies will coordinate with the individual's case manager to assist in the transition planning process.

The Illinois Department of Human Services, Division of Mental Health (DMH) implemented the Continuity of Care Agreement for every state-funded mental health facility which prohibits discharge into homelessness, allows discharge delays in order to prevent it, requires discharge planning staff to

work with community providers to locate appropriate housing, mandates application for mainstream benefits, and that a specific plan for access to follow-up services is prepared. DMH funds a permanent supportive housing initiative Bridge Subsidy Program that assists eligible persons with rent and other transitional expenses while offering support services through local providers. DMH also funds the Region South Crisis Care System in the jurisdiction through the Will County Health Department Division of Behavioral Services (CoC member) that provides crisis response, intake, assessments, connection to mainstream resources, facility placement, transportation, and discharge planning.

Specify the activities that the jurisdiction plans to undertake during the next year to address the housing and supportive services needs identified in accordance with 91.215(e) with respect to persons who are not homeless but have other special needs. Link to one-year goals. 91.315(e)

The City of Joliet proposes to undertake the following activities to address housing and supportive service needs for the non-homeless other special needs population:

- **CD-15-01** Rehabilitation of facilities that are principally designed to serve a neighborhood and that will be used for social services or for multiple purposes (including recreation). Eligible costs associated with eligible activities may include: Energy efficiency improvements; Handicapped accessibility improvements and architectural design features and other treatments aimed at improving aesthetic quality.

The City of Joliet is the County Seat of Will County. As the “County Seat,” it contains a large number of professional offices, educational and health care facilities.

The three (3) largest categories of jobs in business by sector is as follows:

- Education and Health Care Services 9,558 jobs

- Retail Trade 8,086 jobs
- Manufacturing 6,508 jobs

These three categories represent 46.9% of the total number of jobs in the City.

In a February 2014 report on employment conditions in Will County, the Will County Center for Economic Development lists the top-ten (10) employers in Will County. They are listed below:

Describe the workforce and infrastructure needs of the business community:

The City's Economic Development needs include:

Support and encouragement for new job creation, job retention, and job training opportunities.

Support for business and commercial growth through expansion and new development.

Planning and promotion of the development and redevelopment of vacant commercial and industrial sites.

The City of Joliet realizes that there is a need to increase employment, self-sufficiency, educational training, and empowerment of the residents of the City.

Describe any major changes that may have an economic impact, such as planned local or regional public or private sector investments or initiatives that have affected or may affect job and business growth opportunities during the planning period. Describe any needs for workforce development, business support or infrastructure these changes may create.

The City of Joliet has received riverboat gaming revenue since the 1990s and has used these revenues to fund operations. Since the turn of the century, riverboat gaming revenues have continued to either remain flat or decline. This has stagnated gaming growth and gaming investments in Joliet. Gaming in Joliet is a unique revenue source; however Joliet needs to continue to find ways to diversify its job

market. Joliet needs to rely on the CED, Workforce Investment Board and JJC to continue to train area residents in high grown sectors in Will County. Additionally, proposed funding cuts by the State of Illinois will have an impact on the funds received by Joliet and other municipalities in the short term and affect long term state funded social services that keep families working.

How do the skills and education of the current workforce correspond to employment opportunities in the jurisdiction?

According to the 2008-2012 American Community Survey data, the City of Joliet has an unemployment rate of 10.8% which is higher than the Illinois State unemployment rate of 9.3%. In Joliet, there are 51,472 workers and only 40,599 jobs. The unemployment rate is larger in the 18-25 age group as opposed to older age groups. This suggests that the younger members of the workforce need to develop skills and experience, so they would be better able to find employment.

According to the 2006-2010 American Community Survey data, there are job deficiencies (the number of qualified workers exceeds the number of jobs available) in the following sectors:

- Agriculture, Mining, Oil and Gas Extraction - 55.6% of sector workforce is not utilized
- Arts, Entertainment, Accommodations - 19.5% of sector workforce is not utilized
- Construction - 38.1% of sector workforce is not utilized
- Finance, Insurance, and Real Estate - 44.6% of sector workforce is not utilized
- Information - 42.1% of sector workforce is not utilized
- Other Services - 23.4% of sector workforce is not utilized
- Professional, Scientific, Management services - 46.7% of sector workforce is not utilized
- Retail Trade - 17.9% of sector workforce is not utilized
- Transportation and Warehousing - 45.1% of sector workforce is not utilized

The City of Joliet is also experiencing an employment deficiency (the number of jobs available exceeds the number of qualified workers) in the following sector:

- Education and Health Care Services – 19.8% of the available jobs are not filled

Describe any current workforce training initiatives, including those supported by Workforce Investment Boards, community colleges and other organizations. Describe how these efforts will support the jurisdiction's Consolidated Plan.

Joliet Junior College's new "My Future" program will offer career scholarships, covering tuition, fees, and books, for associate degree and other training programs to eligible, low-income youth – and through the program, JJC will even help them land careers once they graduate.

The year long program, funded by the Workforce Investment Board of Will County, the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, and the United States Department of Labor, will

accept 70 students between the ages of 17-21 who have either a high school diploma or a GED certificate. Scholarship recipients must choose a career that's in high demand in Will County.

These careers include, but are not limited to, veterinary technicians, firefighters, police officers, automotive body repairers, machinists, computer programmers, construction managers, truck drivers, certified nurse assistants, and graphic designers.

The program's goals are to keep local youth in the Will County workforce, promote higher education, create skilled workers for in demand jobs, and to retain those workers. These goals, and the outcome of the "My Future" program itself, are much like the college's own goals of increasing student success and completion, preparing students for in demand careers that respond to the labor market, addressing the needs of minorities and underrepresented students, and increasing resource development for students.

This program supports the City of Joliet Consolidated Plan by not only encouraging low income youth to pursue high demand fields but also providing scholarships to participants. This program also ties into the Center for Economic Development's Plan.

The Will County Center for Economic Development (CED) is a 501(c)6 not-for-profit organization, created by the business community in 1981. Governed by a 50-member board and managed by a professional staff, the CED is responsible for attracting and retaining jobs for Will County.

New Business Recruitment

New business recruitment, prospect development and marketing.

Existing Business Retention/Expansion

Countywide retention survey and utilization of business assistance programs to ensure that Will County's existing employers have what they need to grow and prosper.

Municipal Development

Support economic development initiatives of 37 municipalities. Provide county-wide perspective and assistance.

Talent Development

Identification of employer talent needs, employee skill sets, behaviors, and traits; coordination of workforce education and training programs.

Infrastructure Development

Support for development of County's local, regional, national, and global transportation corridors.

Government Affairs

Coordination of political activity in support of County-wide economic development and infrastructure initiatives.

Innovation

Raise awareness of Will County as an innovation location.

The Will County Center for Economic Development and the Workforce Investment Board of Will County partnered in the preparation of two targeted industry and workforce studies for Will County. The primary purpose was to identify industries that the CED should focus attraction and retention/expansion efforts. In addition to identifying industries most suitable for attraction given the local dynamics and industries that should be expanded/retained to sustain the economic vitality of Will County, the studies provided an analysis of the County's ability to produce skilled workers required by its current and future business community and recommended specific tactics for achieving positive results.

The target industries continue to be refined and currently these are the six target industries chosen to recruit businesses from Will County:

- Advanced Manufacturing
- Business & Professional Services
- Food Processing
- Global Transportation
- Life Sciences
- Sustainable/Renewable Energy
- During meetings held in 2010 with current and potential CED investors another target industry was identified, Higher Education.

Discussion

As of the end of December 2014, the City's unemployment rate was 7.3%, while the State of Illinois unemployment rate was 6.2%. The need for new business growth and job opportunities remains a prime concern in Joliet.

MA-50 Needs and Market Analysis Discussion

Are there areas where households with multiple housing problems are concentrated? (include a definition of "concentration")

Households with multiple housing problems are located throughout the City of Joliet. Cost burden in the CHAS data is only available for low and moderate income families. Using other data sources it is evident that cost burden is located everywhere in the City of Joliet. The CHAS data however does reveal information regarding housing problems for specific minority groups and areas of minority concentration are already defined and mapped in this report.

Are there any areas in the jurisdiction where racial or ethnic minorities or low-income families are concentrated? (include a definition of "concentration")

The most recent data available on the concentration of racial or ethnic groups is the 2010 U.S. Census data. According to this data, the City of Joliet has a minority population of 43.8% of its total population. The City uses the definition of an Area of Minority Concentration as a Census Tract or Block Group where at least 50% of the population who reside in that area are identified as being a minority person. Based on this definition there are eight (8) Census Tracts (or partial Census Tracts) in the City with a percentage of minority persons over 50%: Census Tract 8812; Census Tract 8816.03; Census Tract 8819; Census Tract 8820; Census Tract 8824; Census Tract 8825; Census Tract 8826.02; and Census Tract 8831.

Attached to this Plan are maps which illustrate the City of Joliet's demographics and racial concentrations.

What are the characteristics of the market in these areas/neighborhoods?

These areas have the oldest housing stock in the City of Joliet. It has historically housed the working class of the steel and stone industry of Joliet. It is the most affordable place in the City of Joliet to rent, own or become a landlord.

Are there any community assets in these areas/neighborhoods?

The City of Joliet has invested millions in infrastructure since the 1990's, therefore they are unique in that they have mature trees and newer public infrastructure. There is a network of historic churches and social service agencies that serve these majority minority and low income areas. Neighborhood ethnic grocers and restaurants thrive in the strip commercial corridors that team with historic structures from every era since the 1800's. These neighborhoods are centered around the County Seat of Will County with a courthouse, library, senior housing, junior college, private university branch, banking and historic theater.

Are there other strategic opportunities in any of these areas?

The City of Joliet has worked extensively with the owners of the US Steel Company and the State of Illinois on the redevelopment of large tracts of their holdings in these areas. The potential for redevelopment of the old steel mill as commercial or small industrial property is a valuable future opportunity for these neighborhoods. This is in addition to the former prison, now vacant, that is adjacent to the steel mill. The old prison has the potential for tourism, commercial and recreational uses.

Strategic Plan

SP-05 Overview

Strategic Plan Overview

The Five Year Consolidated Plan is a guide for the City of Joliet to use for its housing, community development, and economic programs and initiatives. The Strategic Plan portion of the Five Year Consolidated Plan establishes the City's goals and objectives to address its needs in the following six (6) categories:

- Housing
- Homelessness
- Special needs
- Community development
- Economic development
- Anti-poverty

These strategies are the result of meetings, surveys, and consultation. It is based on the needs assessment and market analysis.

The over-riding objective and strategy for the City is to benefit low- and moderate-income residents (income of less than 80% of the area median income). These residents are referred to as the "target income" group. The City has an overall low- and moderate-income population of 56.7%. The City is compliant with the Federal requirement that at least 70% of all its CDBG funds must principally benefit low- and moderate-income persons. The City is committed to providing at least 70% of its CDBG budget for LMI persons and has designed its Strategic Plan to meet that requirement.

The principles of the FY 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan are as follows:

- **Assist** - by developing comprehensive strategies to support and assist those residents who are low and moderate income.
- **Involve** - the community and provide opportunities for citizen input in the planning process and preparation of the plan.
- **Collaborate** - between public, private, and non-profit agencies and organizations to ensure that activities and services will be efficient and effective.

General Allocation Priorities

Describe the basis for allocating investments geographically within the jurisdiction (or within the EMSA for HOPWA)

The City of Joliet will allocate its CDBG funds to those geographic areas whose population is over 51% low- and moderate-income. At least 70% of all the City's CDBG funds that are budgeted for activities will principally benefit low- and moderate-income persons. The following guidelines for allocating CDBG and HOME funds will be used during the FY 2015-2019 Five Year Consolidated Plan:

- The public services activities are for social service organizations whose clientele have a low income or in certain cases, a limited type of clientele with a presumed low- and moderate-income status.
- The public facilities activities are either located in a low- and moderate-income census tract/block group or have a low- and moderate-income service area benefit or clientele over 51% low- and moderate-income.
- The acquisitions and demolition of structures are either located in a low- and moderate-income census area or these activities are eligible by preventing or eliminating slums and blight on a spot basis or area basis.
- The housing activities have income eligibility criteria, therefore the income requirement directs funds to low- and moderate-income households throughout the City.

- Economic development projects will either be located in a low- and moderate-income census tract/block group, or a poverty tract greater than 20%, or part of a redevelopment plan, or making 51% of the jobs available to low- and moderate-income population.

The HOME funds will be used for administration and for housing projects. These funds will be targeted to low-income persons and projects designed to provide affordable housing to low-income persons and are located in low- and moderate-income areas and non low- and moderate-income areas.

In addition to Federal funds, the City of Joliet plans on using State and Local resources to meet the priority needs identified in this plan. The following programs will be utilized by the City of Joliet throughout the duration of this Consolidated Plan:

State Housing Trust Fund: The Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA) has historically awarded the City of Joliet trust fund dollars to assist very low-income and low-income home buyers. Funding equal to \$20,000.00 or \$30,000.00, depending on the household income level, is provided, at a zero percent interest rate and amortized over a thirty year period and due as a balloon payment at maturity. Down payment grants of \$3,000.00 or \$5,000.00 are available, depending on the household income level, and forgivable over a five year term. From 2011-2012 the City of Joliet, utilized these funds and \$10,000 in HOME Downpayment Assistance to assist 10 homebuyers. The City of Joliet will apply for IHDA Trust Funds should they become available again.

The Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA) awarded the City of Joliet \$1,890,000.00 in Neighborhood Stabilization Program 3 (NSP3) funds. The State of Illinois was awarded \$5 million from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Section 1497 of the Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act of 2010 (Dodd-Frank Act) to provide funding for eligible activities under the third round of NSP. The primary focus of the NSP3 funding is to demonstrate impact by addressing the negative results of vacant and foreclosed properties on communities. In order to achieve the impact desired, the State of Illinois is requiring that all housing rehabbed and sold/rented be included within a designated target area. In Joliet, the target area is roughly outlined as Taylor Street on the North, Interstate 80 on the South, Collins Street on the East and Midland Ave on the West. These funds have substantially similar requirements as NSP1 funding.

Roadway Improvement Program: The City of Joliet implements neighborhood public works projects through the Roadway Improvement Program. These projects include street reconstruction, street lighting, drainage and storm sewer projects. It is anticipated that the Roadway Improvement Program budget for 2014 will be approximately \$1.1 million which is funded by the State of Illinois Motor Fuel Tax Fund.

Volume Cap: Annually, the City of Joliet receives an allocation of “tax exempt private activity” bonds known as “Volume Cap” from the State of Illinois. In the past, the Volume Cap has been used to finance tax-free bond for various industrial and residential projects. Section 146 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the “Code”), provides that the City of Joliet has a Volume Cap equal to \$95 per resident.

Public Land Auction: The City of Joliet has been acquiring vacant parcels through a public auction administered by the Will County Tax Agent for the past sixteen years. Many of these properties are used for the development of new single family homes on scattered sites. The homes are offered for purchase through the Local Homestead Program to low and moderate-income families.

ASSIST Program: In 2014, the City of Joliet ceded \$8,000,000 of its bonding volume cap to the Assist/Mortgage Credit Certificate Program. This program provides 3% cash assistance to homebuyers at a low interest rate from local lenders. It also allows the homebuyer to obtain a Mortgage Credit Certificate of up to \$2,000 per year on their Federal Income Taxes, for the life of the loan.

The City has a 25% Match Requirement for the HOME Program which it will meet with the State Funds and other allowable match.

The Will County area has long supported its homeless and at-risk population through a strong and committed service provider network. Our community continues to witness an increase in demand for services and with the implementation of new welfare reform legislation, the needs among local individuals and families will further increase. In 2014, Kendall and Grundy Counties joined our Continuum of Care and our now part of our geographic service area.

The Will County Continuum of Care (CoC) is dedicated to streamlining and strengthening the current service delivery system through even greater collaborative planning, partnership and program execution. The CoC membership is made up of Government entities, elected officials, non-profit organizations, financial institutions, businesses, housing developers, churches, health care providers, neighborhood associations, educators, the media, homeless as well as formerly homeless persons and others. It is the vision of the Continuum of Care to create a seamless, comprehensive system of services that:

- Prevents and ends homelessness

- Supports the emergency as well as ongoing supportive needs of the homeless and at-risk population
- Provides the tools necessary to sustain needs of the homeless and at-risk population
- Leads to permanent self-sufficiency

The Will County Center for Community Concerns is the lead agency for the Will County Continuum of Care and provides administrative support for its committees and functions.

Need to Increase the Number of Accessible Units (if Required by a Section 504 Voluntary Compliance Agreement)

In 1992, the Housing Authority of Joliet developed a Section 504 Transition Plan to address the need for mobility and sight/hearing accessible rental units; to date, a total of 106 rental units were brought into compliance.

In 2011, the Housing Authority of Joliet conducted a second study relative to ADA compliance. Deficiencies were identified and the Housing Authority anticipates it will begin implementing compliance measures over the next two year period as funding becomes available.

The Public Housing Program waiting list has identified 727 households as having a member who may be classified as disabled/handicapped.

Activities to Increase Resident Involvements

The Housing Authority of Joliet holds regular Resident Advisory Board Meetings. These meetings involve not only Housing Authority staff, but representatives from all of the Public Housing Communities. Topics addressed at these meetings range from broad policy topics, such as the Revitalization Plan, to quality of life issues, such as posting instructions on how to use the washer and dryer in the building.

Impediment 7:

The City's process for allocating and reporting CDBG, HOME and NSP funds could be improved from a fair housing perspective.

Impediment 9:

The City's zoning ordinance should be reviewed and amended to remove burdensome regulations that may restrict group housing for people with disabilities.

Impediment 10:

Public transit service is largely limited to higher density areas of Joliet, and does not accommodate persons working evening, night and weekend shifts.

Strategy to Remove or Ameliorate the Barriers to Affordable Housing

The City's Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice listed 11 impediments. The following 3 impediments relate to affordable housing and residential investment:

Impediment 7:

The City's process for allocating and reporting CDBG, HOME and NSP funds could be improved from a fair housing perspective.

Analysis of the City's Annual Plan and CAPER documents reveal a significant investment of CDBG and HOME funds in racially and ethnically impacted areas, in particular in the east and near-west areas of Joliet. While improving quality of life in lower-income minority neighborhoods is an important aim, the City must also demonstrate an effort to affirmatively further fair housing by expanding the availability of affordable housing in non-impacted areas. The City should continue to allocate funds for new family housing developments (both sales and rental) on sites outside of impacted areas, such as Liberty Meadows Estates.

Impediment 9:

The City's zoning ordinance should be reviewed and amended to remove burdensome regulations that may restrict group housing for people with disabilities.

According to the City's zoning ordinance, stricter regulations are applied to community residential homes for groups of unrelated people with disabilities than are applied to single family dwellings for unrelated people without disabilities. Overly burdensome requirements, including distancing requirements between residential homes may have the effect of precluding such uses altogether from certain neighborhoods.

Impediment 10:

Public transit service is largely limited to higher density areas of Joliet, and does not accommodate persons working evening, night and weekend shifts.

While this policy is certainly understandable from a transportation management perspective, it has the effect of limiting fair housing choice. Lack of reliable 24-hour transportation to and from work is a significant barrier to fair housing choice in Joliet. Black households and renter households are most likely to be transit-dependent. Among Black households, 15.8% were transit-dependent compared to 7.1% of White households in 2000. One in five renter households did not have access to a vehicle, compared to 3.6% of owner households.

Residents in the western and far western areas of Joliet have very limited public transit options. This policy impedes the development of affordable housing in these non-impacted areas of the City.

SP-60 Homelessness Strategy – 91.215(d)

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The Will County Health Department has a PATH and an outreach program with 2 workers to engage severely mentally ill persons on the streets or other places not meant for human habitation. MorningStar Mission hosts multi-agency events for homeless persons who are referred/invited by providers and the police department. Other providers host Job Fairs, Mobile Dental Units, public showers, etc. Two high-volume soup kitchens record data in HMIS. Homeless persons are referred to CoC staff directly for services. Education through forums, local meetings, and resource materials are provided to law enforcement agencies, service providers, local governments, faith-based organizations, and school district homeless liaisons throughout the county. The CoC has also established a Consumer Committee to assist with outreach efforts.

Addressing the emergency and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Many of the shelters provide case management services to assist homeless persons, including chronically homeless individuals and families, to make the transition to permanent housing. During their shelter stays, counseling is provided to the heads of the households to improve their incomes, either through employment or referrals to state and federal agencies to supplement their income and/or to address their disabilities. They are referred to programs such as Medicaid, food stamps, veterans' health benefits, disability, social security, etc. Case management staff refer the disabled, homeless individuals and families to permanent supportive housing programs. Veterans are referred to the VA Center in Joliet, veterans' housing choices, and the VASH supportive housing vouchers. Shelter care case management staff assists clients in locating suitable housing that they can continue to live in upon discharge.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again.

No unaccompanied youth were identified in recent Point In Time counts. The CoC participates in the Child and Adolescent Local Area Network (LAN) #49 that coordinates efforts of providers serving children and adolescents. A "wraparound process" is engaged to address all the needs of youth and provide crisis prevention/response individually. Aunt Martha's Youth Service Center offers public education, provider training, case management, referral and linkage, transportation assistance, housing search and placement, consumer education, budget counseling, and cash assistance for qualified homeless youth aged 18-24. Aunt Martha's works directly with the Illinois Department of Children and

Family Services to provide services when a ward of the state has been identified aged 16-17. The Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) contracts screening, assessment, and support service (SASS) agencies for youth that may be in need of mental health services, provided through the Will County Health Department.

The CoC works with the Veterans Assistance Commission of Will County that provides interim/emergency financial assistance; advocacy services in applying to agencies to procure benefits; works closely with all veteran organizations, utility companies, landlords, local, state and Federal agencies to ensure the rights and benefits to which each veteran is entitled; and provides assistance with filing claims to the VA. The HUD/VASH Program Coordinator for the Hines VA Center joined the CoC in 2011 to coordinate services. The Hines VA Center opened a clinic in 2013 in Joliet to provide additional health and support services. Transitional housing for veterans is provided by Family and Friends (GPD) and MorningStar Ministries. Permanent supportive housing is provided through Cornerstone Services and Catholic Charities (SHP). Catholic Charities and Midwest Shelter for Homeless Veterans provide services through the SSVF in Joliet.

Help low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families who are likely to become homeless after being discharged from a publicly funded institution or system of care, or who are receiving assistance from public and private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education or youth needs

The CoC is in the process of developing a system-wide HMIS report that can be used also for individual projects that will calculate recidivism rates according to household characteristics, to determine any patterns or commonalities among households returning to homelessness. This will help to further evaluate project performance as well as help define any particular populations with gaps in services that need to be addressed. Until the report is developed, CoC staff will pull individualized reports from the System Administrator level with anonymous data to monitor projects and provide technical assistance for reducing recidivism for those exiting the projects to determine whether the extent of services, improper targeting, connection to other resources, etc. needs to be improved.

SP-65 Lead based paint Hazards – 91.215(i)

Actions to address LBP hazards and increase access to housing without LBP hazards

The homes which the City acquired and rehabilitated through its Local Homestead Program are located in low and moderate census tracts, which include the majority of housing units built prior to 1978. Purchasers of pre-1978 built houses are provided with a copy of the lead paint pamphlet, "Protect Your Family From Lead in Your Home." The City also requires contractors to follow HUD's lead-based paint regulations for construction and rehabilitation projects funded through the CDBG and HOME programs. Work write-ups for projects include a section on lead-based paint testing and abatement when necessary under the current regulations. The City also includes a section on Residential Lead Paint Disclosure Requirements in the Landlord Training Manual, which landlords receive when they participate in the Landlord Conference. Staff continues to attend training on these requirements.

In Will County, three zip codes are at high risk for lead poisoning: 60432, 60433, and 60436. All three of the zip codes are located in the City of Joliet. The Illinois Lead Program Surveillance Report – 2011, contains the results of blood lead testing in Will County on all children age 15 years old or younger. The vast majority of 2010 tests (93 percent) were performed on children younger than 6 years of age:

- 10,930 children were tested in Will County
- 275 children had blood lead test results of 0-5 ug/dL
- 76 children had blood lead test results of 5-10 ug/dL

Children at highest risk for lead exposure include those with persistent oral behaviors, low-income households, African-Americans, children exposed to imported products containing lead, children with low iron, and those residing in deteriorating pre-1978 housing units. Approximately 60 percent of pre-1978 housing units have a prevalence of lead-based paint and 42 percent have significant lead-based paint hazards.

Lead testing is required for:

- Children residing in high-risk areas for lead exposure or who answer "YES" or "I DO NOT KNOW" to the Childhood Lead Risk Questionnaire (CLRQ)
- Children receiving services from Medicaid; Head Start; All Kids; Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

In 2009 Will County applied for and received a "Lead Hazard Control Program" grant in the amount of \$2,070,000. Since the inception of this grant, they have maintained the highest ranking "green" and exceed unit production targets. To date, they have completed and cleared 176 units and have a State Licensed Lead Risk Assessor on staff. They have not in received another "Lead Hazard Control Program" grant.

How are the actions listed above related to the extent of lead poisoning and hazards?

The City of Joliet has the highest rate of incidents of lead based paint poisoning in Will County. This high frequency of lead based paint hazards is largely due to an older housing stock and insufficient funds (both private and public) to address the issue. These hazards disproportionately affect poor, African American children.

How are the actions listed above integrated into housing policies and procedures?

Actions to reduce the number of incidents of lead-based paint poisoning are integrated into the City of Joliet's housing programs. Any project involving home rehabilitation and homeowner assistance is subject to the City's program to reduce lead-based paint hazards.

SP-70 Anti-Poverty Strategy – 91.215(j)

Jurisdiction Goals, Programs and Policies for reducing the number of Poverty-Level Families

Joliet is the most affordable community in Will County that has access to major interstates and jobs. Joliet is also home to a public housing authority, and a network of homeless shelters and permanent supportive housing facilities. These agencies all work to care for the immediate needs of poverty level families and foster self-sufficiency. They are supported by a web of neighborhood centers and churches that offer food banks, youth services, immigration services and resident empowerment. Residents also have access to health care via the Will Grundy Medical Clinic, Health Department and Aunt Martha's. This is essential, because poverty-level families need to be healthy to work and pull themselves out of poverty. This coupled with the Will County Center for Community Concerns that enables low and moderate income individuals to obtain the opportunities needed to prepare themselves for self-sufficiency through housing counseling and emergency services. These safety net service providers meet monthly as part of the Continuum of Care and as needed to define and remove gaps to reducing the number of poverty-level families.

In 2006 the City established the Quality of Life (QOL) Task Force to analyze the needs of City District 4 and 5 residents who are low and moderate income. One outcome of the Quality of Life Plan was the formation of Unity CDC, which will oversee proposed actions in ten subject areas in City Districts 4 and 5. The subject areas are housing, education, human capital, industrial development, employment, land use, neighborhood character, recreation, retail development and transportation. The City continues to work closely with Unity CDC in the development and completion of the action items.

How are the Jurisdiction poverty reducing goals, programs, and policies coordinated with this affordable housing plan

The Housing Plan as presented provides homeownership and rental opportunities for Joliet residents. The community network helps to stabilize families and work toward self-sufficiency. Under the HOME program residents who are low income can access decent rental opportunities through housing that will be supported over the next five years. Those with developmental disabilities will be able to access decent rental housing with permanent supportive services. Families that have established themselves will be able to access newly constructed housing in their neighborhood or receive down payment assistance toward housing anywhere in Joliet. These opportunities are further supported by the City of Joliet's CDBG efforts to acquire and redevelop Evergreen Terrace as a mixed income sustainable development. This is in addition to strengthening neighborhood centers, homeless services, emergency home repair, removing blight and investing in infrastructure.

SP-80 Monitoring – 91.230

Describe the standards and procedures that the jurisdiction will use to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and will use to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

The Neighborhood Services Division, on behalf of the City of Joliet, has developed monitoring standards and procedures that it will follow during the implementation of the FY 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan. Performance monitoring is an important component in the long-term success of the City's Programs. The Neighborhood Services Division is responsible for ensuring that the recipients of Federal funds meet the purposes of the appropriate legislation and regulations, and that funds are disbursed in a timely manner.

The Neighborhood Services Division will monitor activities carried out to further the 5-year Consolidated Plan and to ensure long-term compliance with program requirements. The objectives of this monitoring are to make sure that activities: 1) comply with all regulations governing their administrative, financial, and programmatic operation; 2) achieve their performance objectives within schedule and budget; and 3) comply with the Consolidated Plan.

The Neighborhood Services Division prepares agreements for housing and non-housing activities financed with CDBG and HOME funds. Invoices are monitored for compliance with the approved spending plan and Federal Regulations. The Neighborhood Services Division administers the Integrated Disbursement and Information System (IDIS). The Neighborhood Services Division is also primarily responsible for setting up and administering activities. The monitoring standards and procedures that have been adopted ensure that statutory and regulatory requirements are being met and the information submitted to HUD is correct and complete.

The monitoring procedures and requirements of the Consolidated Plan will be an extension of the Neighborhood Services Division's existing monitoring system and experience in administering State and Federal programs. The standards and procedures established by the Neighborhood Services Division for monitoring the implementation of the Consolidated Plan ensure that:

- The objectives of the National Affordable Housing Act are met;
- Program activities are progressing in compliance with timely parameters;
- The use of all funds is consistent with HUD guidelines; and,
- All participating agencies are in compliance with applicable laws implementing regulations, and in particular, with requirements to affirmatively further fair housing and minimize displacement of LMI persons.

The Neighborhood Services Division monitors the various programs and activities that are funded with the CDBG and HOME grants. A subrecipient monitoring plan has been put in place to ensure compliance

by agencies funded with the CDBG public service and public facilities funding and housing development funded with HOME funds. The following key components of the CDBG monitoring process ensure that the City's Consolidated Plan goals are being met in a timely and efficient manner:

- **Recordkeeping Systems** – Recordkeeping requirements outlined in 24 CFR Part 570.503 are adhered to. Each project file is documented as to eligibility and national objective, the beneficiaries of the activity, procurements, agreements, and related compliance issues.
- **Financial Management** – All financial transactions are carefully recorded and reconciled between the in-house system and IDIS.
- **Audit Management** – All audits are conducted in accordance with federal and State regulations, specifically Federal OMB circulars A-128 and A-133.

HOME activities undertaken by CHDO's and other non-profit housing providers are similarly monitored. Each CHDO agreement contains monitoring provisions for recordkeeping, fair housing compliance, financial management and audits.

Introduction

The City of Joliet is receiving \$889,834 from CDBG funds and \$350,143 from HOME funds for the FY 2015 program year. The program year goes from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2016. Based on a 5% cut in funds, the Municipality projects the following anticipated resources:

- FY 2015 = \$889,834 CDBG + \$350,143 HOME
- FY 2016 = \$845,342 CDBG + \$332,636 HOME
- FY 2017 = \$803,075 CDBG + \$316,004 HOME
- FY 2018 = \$762,921 CDBG + \$300,204 HOME
- FY 2019 = \$724,775 CDBG + \$285,194 HOME
- **Total** = \$4,025,947 CDBG + \$1,584,181 HOME

Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

In addition to Federal funds, the City of Joliet plans on using State and Local resources to meet the priority needs identified in this plan. The following programs will be utilized by the City of Joliet throughout the duration of this Consolidated Plan:

State Housing Trust Fund: The Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA) has historically awarded the City of Joliet trust fund dollars to

assist very low-income and low-income home buyers. Funding equal to \$20,000.00 or \$30,000.00, depending on the household income level, is provided, at a zero percent interest rate and amortized over a thirty year period and due as a balloon payment at maturity. Down payment grants of \$3,000.00 or \$5,000.00 are available, depending on the household income level, and forgivable over a five year term. From 2011-2012 the City of Joliet, utilized these funds and \$10,000 in HOME Downpayment Assistance to assist 10 homebuyers. The City of Joliet will apply for IHDA Trust Funds should they become available again.

The Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA) awarded the City of Joliet \$1,890,000.00 in Neighborhood Stabilization Program 3 (NSP3) funds. The State of Illinois was awarded \$5 million from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Section 1497 of the Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act of 2010 (Dodd-Frank Act) to provide funding for eligible activities under the third round of NSP. The primary focus of the NSP3 funding is to demonstrate impact by addressing the negative results of vacant and foreclosed properties on communities. In order to achieve the impact desired, the State of Illinois is requiring that all housing rehabbed and sold/rented be included within a designated target area. In Joliet, the target area is roughly outlined as Taylor Street on the North, Interstate 80 on the South, Collins Street on the East and Midland Ave on the West. These funds have substantially similar requirements as NSP1 funding.

Roadway Improvement Program: The City of Joliet implements neighborhood public works projects through the Roadway Improvement Program. These projects include street reconstruction, street lighting, drainage and storm sewer projects. It is anticipated that the Roadway Improvement Program budget for 2014 will be approximately \$1.1 million which is funded by the State of Illinois Motor Fuel Tax Fund.

Volume Cap: Annually, the City of Joliet receives an allocation of “tax exempt private activity” bonds known as “Volume Cap” from the State of Illinois. In the past, the Volume Cap has been used to finance tax-free bond for various industrial and residential projects. Section 146 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the “Code”), provides that the City of Joliet has a Volume Cap equal to \$95 per resident.

If appropriate, describe publically owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan

Public Land Auction: The City of Joliet has been acquiring vacant parcels through a public auction administered by the Will County Tax Agent for the past sixteen years. Many of these properties are used for the development of new single family homes on scattered sites. The homes are offered for purchase through the Local Homestead Program to low and moderate-income families.

ASSIST Program: In 2014, the City of Joliet ceded \$8,000,000 of its bonding volume cap to the Assist/Mortgage Credit Certificate Program. This program provides 3% cash assistance to homebuyers at a low interest rate from local lenders. It also allows the homebuyer to obtain a Mortgage Credit Certificate of up to \$2,000 per year on their Federal Income Taxes, for the life of the loan.

The City has a 25% Match Requirement for the HOME Program which it will meet with the State Funds and other allowable match.

AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h)

Introduction

The Housing Authority of Joliet is the public housing agency that serves the City of Joliet and Will County. The mission of the Housing Authority of Joliet is: “To create strong, sustainable, inclusive communities and quality affordable homes for all; strengthen the housing market to bolster the economy and protect consumers; meet the need for quality affordable rental homes by utilizing housing as a platform for improving quality of life; build inclusive and sustainable communities free from discrimination; and transform the way we do business.”

The Housing Authority of Joliet owns and operates 7 public housing communities. There are a total of 991 housing units in the public housing communities. Roughly two thirds of the public housing units are reserved for the elderly.

In addition, the Housing Authority administers 1,190 Housing Choice Vouchers for low- to moderate-income households for rental units in the City and surrounding region. There are 268 Family Unification Program Vouchers and 388 Disabled Vouchers included in that total.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

The Housing Authority of Joliet’s strategies for addressing the housing needs of families in the jurisdiction and on the waiting list in the upcoming year are listed below. All strategies were developed to address the shortage of affordable housing for all eligible populations in the area. Strategies can be affected by funding constraints; staffing constraints; limited availability of sites for assisted housing; extent to which particular housing needs are met by other organizations in the community; evidence of housing needs as demonstrated in the Consolidated Plan and other information available to the PHA; influence of the housing market on PHA programs; community priorities regarding housing assistance; and results of consultation with local or state government.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The Housing Authority of Joliet encourages residents of its public housing communities to organize community groups to become more involved in housing management. Neighborhood crime watch groups are encouraged and assistance is needed to ensure the safety of residents. Additionally, the PHA schedules regular meetings at public housing sites to discuss needs and concerns. Voucher holders are also encouraged to participate in regular PHA meetings.

If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will be provided or other assistance

The Housing Authority of Joliet is not designated as troubled.

Discussion

The Housing Authority of Joliet will continue to address the need for affordable housing using the Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) financing model, such as their Liberty Meadows development. There is sufficient land that the Housing Authority owns to develop new affordable housing.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i)

Introduction

The Five Year Consolidated Plan is to serve as a consolidated planning document, an application, and a strategic plan for the City of Joliet, IL. The following goals and objectives for the City of Joliet's Homeless Strategy have been identified for the five year period of FY 2015 through FY 2019.

HO-1 Continuum of Care - Support the local Continuum of Care's (CoC) efforts to provide emergency shelter, transitional housing, and permanent supportive housing to persons and families who are homeless or who are at risk of becoming homeless.

HO-2 Operation/Support - Assist providers in the operation of housing and support services for the homeless and persons at-risk of becoming homeless.

HO-3 Housing – Support the development of permanent supportive housing for homeless individuals and families.

HO-4 Housing – Support the rehabilitation of and making accessibility improvements to emergency shelters, transitional housing and permanent housing for the homeless.

HO-5 Permanent Housing – Support the development of permanent supportive housing for homeless individuals and families.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The Unsheltered Homeless is the segment of a homeless community who do not have ordinary lawful access to buildings in which to sleep, as referred to in the HUD definition as persons occupying "place not meant for human habitation" (examples: bus stop, beach, riverbed, van, RV, sidewalk, bridges, underpasses, etc.). The City will work with providers whose shelters are at capacity, to find shelter for this population in the form of emergency and transitional housing.

The Sheltered Homeless are those in an emergency shelter, in transitional housing, or exiting an institution where they temporarily resided lacking a fixed nighttime residence. People will be considered homeless if they are exiting an institution where they resided for up to 90 days (it was previously 30 days), and people who are losing their primary nighttime residence which may be a motel, hotel, or a doubled up situation within 14 days and lack resources or support networks to remain housed. The City will also refer homeless providers to groups that can offer permanent housing solutions for the homeless and chronically homeless.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Due to the fact that the beds in the shelters in and around the City are always full, there is an unsheltered homeless population.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Joliet will support the efforts of local agencies that provide transitional housing for Veterans and their families, families with children and families that are victims of domestic violence, and individuals dealing with mental health or substance abuse problems, to move them into more permanent housing solutions. The City will also assist by matching homeless service providers with other supportive services that can help their clients to become self-sufficient.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City of Joliet will support the efforts of local agencies that provide assistance to families and individuals in transitional situations and will refer residents of the City that are at risk of becoming homeless to these agencies for help with financial literacy counseling, emergency rent/mortgage or utility payments, and job training so that they can remain self-sufficient and avoid homelessness.

Discussion

The City of Joliet will continue to support the Continuum of Care's efforts and application for funding for the State ESG funds. The City will cooperate with the CoC in identifying programs and activities to reduce chronic homelessness.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

Introduction:

In 2013 the City of Joliet completed an Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice as required by HUD. This document was the product of an analysis of the City of Joliet's laws, regulations, and administrative policies, procedures, and practices affecting the location, availability, and accessibility of housing, as well as an assessment of conditions, both public and private, affecting fair housing choice.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

Impediment 9:

The City's zoning ordinance should be reviewed and amended to remove burdensome regulations that may restrict group housing for people with disabilities.

According to the City's zoning ordinance, stricter regulations are applied to community residential homes for groups of unrelated people with disabilities than are applied to single family dwellings for unrelated people without disabilities. Overly burdensome requirements, including distancing requirements between residential homes may have the effect of precluding such uses altogether from certain neighborhoods.

Discussion:

The City is reviewing all of its policies and procedures to make sure that it will reduce or eliminate any barriers to fair housing. The City of Joliet is committed to affirmatively furthering fair housing.

AP-85 Other Actions – 91.220(k)

Introduction:

The City of Joliet has developed the following actions which addresses obstacles to meeting underserved needs, fosters affordable housing, reduces lead-based hazards, reduces the number of poverty families, develops institutional structures, and enhances coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

Despite City and service provider efforts, there remains a significant number of obstacles to meeting underserved needs. The following are obstacles to meeting these needs in Joliet.

- Continued population growth creating a housing shortage
- Insufficient vouchers for very low income residents
- Aging in-place population

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

To foster and maintain affordable housing, the City of Joliet proposes to carry out the following activities:

- **HS-1 Housing Rehabilitation** – Continue to provide financial assistance to low- and moderate-income homeowners to rehabilitate their existing owner-occupied housing.
- **HS-2 Rental Rehabilitation** – Provide financial assistance to landlords to rehabilitate housing units that are rented to low- and moderate-income tenants.
- **HS-3 Housing Construction** – Increase the supply of decent, safe, sound, and accessible housing that is affordable to owners and renters in the community through rehabilitation of vacant buildings and new construction.
- **HS-4 Fair Housing** – Promote fair housing choice through education and outreach in the community.
- **HS-5 Home Ownership** – Assist low- and moderate-income households to become homeowners by providing down payment assistance, closing cost assistance, and requiring housing counseling training.
- **HS-6 Public Housing** – Support the local public housing authority in its efforts to improve public housing by constructing new affordable housing on scattered sites throughout the community to replace deteriorated public housing.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

The City of Joliet will undertake activities to reduce the number of lead-based paint hazards in residential properties. The risk of lead-based paint hazards is very high in the City of Joliet due to the

number of housing units constructed prior to 1978. It is presumed that all housing units constructed before 1978 contain lead-based paint. 51.7% of houses in the City of Joliet fall into this category.

The City of Joliet provides purchasers of pre-1978 built city-owned houses with the lead paint pamphlet, "Protect Your Family From Lead in Your Home." The City also requires contractors to follow HUD's lead-based paint regulations for construction and rehabilitation projects funded through the CDBG and HOME programs. Work write-ups for projects include a section on lead-based paint testing and abatement when necessary under the current regulations. The City also includes a section on Residential Lead Paint Disclosure Requirements in the Landlord Conference. Staff continues to attend training on these requirements.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey, approximately 12.0% of Joliet's residents live in poverty. Female-headed households with children are particularly affected by poverty at 30.4%, and 13.3% of all youth under the age of 18 were living in poverty. This information is taken from the U.S. Census "2007-2011" ACS Five Year Estimates. The City's goal of reducing the extent of poverty is 5%, based on actions the City has control over, or actions in which the City will cooperate with outside agencies.

The City's anti-poverty strategy is based on attracting a range of businesses and supporting workforce development, including job-training services for low income residents. In addition, the City's strategy is to provide supportive services for target income residents.

Planned economic development and anti-poverty programs include:

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The Will County area has long supported its homeless and at-risk population through a strong and committed service provider network. Our community continues to witness an increase in demand for services and with the implementation of new welfare reform legislation, the needs among local individuals and families will further increase. In 2014, Kendall and Grundy Counties joined our Continuum of Care and our now part of our geographic service area.

The Will County Continuum of Care (CoC) is dedicated to streamlining and strengthening the current service delivery system through even greater collaborative planning, partnership and program execution. The CoC membership is made up of Government entities, elected officials, non-profit organizations, financial institutions, businesses, housing developers, churches, health care providers, neighborhood associations, educators, the media, homeless as well as formerly homeless persons and others. It is the vision of the Continuum of Care to create a seamless, comprehensive system of services that:

- Prevents and ends homelessness
- Supports the emergency as well as ongoing supportive needs of the homeless and at-risk population
- Provides the tools necessary to sustain needs of the homeless and at-risk population
- Leads to permanent self-sufficiency

The Will County Center for Community Concerns is the lead agency for the Will County Continuum of Care and provides administrative support for its committees and functions.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City of Joliet is a member of the Will County Continuum of Care. The Will County Continuum of Care is the network for all social service providers in the region. They include the housing authority, health department and other agencies. The City of Joliet has engaged in an activity to purchase and redevelop the property known as Evergreen Terrace with the intent to create a mixed income community of homeowners and renters, development of a community center and a public park. This project is truly the culmination of public and private housing providers and social service agencies. The task at hand will enhance the coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies.

Discussion:

The City of Joliet has prepared and adopted a substantial amendment to its FY 2012, FY 2013, and FY 2014 CDBG and HOME Program Years. The City will be allocating the bulk of its funds to the redevelopment of the Evergreen Terrace Housing Development. The City will now be able to move forward with the acquisition and redevelopment of affordable housing.

HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME)

Reference 24 CFR 91.220(I)(2)

1. A description of other forms of investment being used beyond those identified in Section 92.205 is as follows:

State Housing Trust Fund: \$20,000-\$30,000 in State funds for income eligible home buyers for

downpayment assistance.

Volume Cap: \$95 per resident.

2. A description of the guidelines that will be used for resale or recapture of HOME funds when used for homebuyer activities as required in 92.254, is as follows:

The City of Joliet utilizes a recapture provision in its First-Time Homebuyer Downpayment Assistance Program. The period of affordability is based on the amount of HOME assistance, including any program income, provided as direct HOME subsidy to the homebuyer that enables him or her to buy the unit. The direct subsidy includes downpayment, closing costs, interest subsidies, or other HOME assistance that reduces the purchase price from fair market value to an affordable price. This means that if HOME funds are used for the cost of developing a property and the unit is sold below fair market value, the difference between the fair market value and the purchase price is considered to be directly attributable to the HOME subsidy and is assistance to the homebuyer. The chart below specifies the length of the affordability period for varying amounts of assistance:

- Under \$15,000 - Minimum Period of Affordability is 5 Years
- \$15,000-\$40,000 - Minimum Period of Affordability is 10 Years
- Over \$40,000 - Minimum Period of Affordability is 15 Years

The recapture provision requires that all or a portion of the direct subsidy provided to the homebuyer be recaptured from the net proceeds of the sale. Net proceeds are defined as the sales price minus superior loan repayment (other than HOME funds) and any closing costs. Under no circumstances can the City of Joliet recapture more than is available from the net proceeds of the sale. If the homebuyer transfers the property either voluntarily or involuntarily during the period of affordability, the City of Joliet recovers, from available net proceeds, all or a portion of the HOME assistance provided to the homebuyer. Under recapture, there is no requirement that the original HOME-assisted homebuyer sell the unit to another low-income homebuyer. Recapture of the HOME funds releases the original homebuyer from additional HOME affordability obligations. The City of Joliet then uses the recaptured HOME funds for another HOME eligible activity.

The City of Joliet has adopted the "Reduction During Affordability Period" option as its recapture provision for its First-time Homebuyer Downpayment Assistance Program. Under this recapture option, the City of Joliet reduces the amount of direct HOME subsidy on a pro-rata basis for the time the homebuyer has owned and occupied the housing, measured against the required affordability period. The resulting ratio is used to determine how much of the direct HOME subsidy the City recaptures. The pro-rata amount recaptured by the City of Joliet cannot exceed what is available from net proceeds. The computation to determine the pro-rata amount recaptured by the City of Joliet is as follows:

- Divide the number of years the homebuyer occupied the home by the period of affordability.
- Multiply the resulting figure by the total amount of direct HOME subsidy originally provided to the homebuyer. The result is the amount forgiven.
- Subtract the amount forgiven from the total amount of direct HOME subsidy. The result is the recapture amount.

Another way to express this computation is:

(Number of years homebuyer occupied the home/Period of Affordability) X Total direct HOME subsidy = Amount Forgiven

Then: Total direct HOME subsidy – Amount Forgiven = Recapture Amount

(Continued in Discussion)

3. A description of the guidelines for resale or recapture that ensures the affordability of units acquired with HOME funds? See 24 CFR 92.254(a)(4) are as follows:

When the only HOME funds invested in a project are for development subsidies to the developer that do not result in assistance to the homebuyer, there are no HOME funds subject to recapture. Although the City of Joliet does not, nor does it intend to, operate such a program in the future, the following resale provision would be used by the City of Joliet to enforce the period of affordability and principal residency requirement and terms under those circumstances. When utilizing a resale provision, the period of affordability is based on the amount of HOME funds, including program income, invested per unit. The chart below specifies the length of the affordability period for varying amounts of assistance:

- Under \$15,000 - Minimum Period of Affordability is 5 Years
- \$15,000-\$40,000 - Minimum Period of Affordability is 10 Years
- Over \$40,000 - Minimum Period of Affordability is 15 Years

The HOME resale requirements ensure that, when a HOME-assisted property is sold by the homebuyer, either voluntarily or involuntarily, during the affordability period that the sale meets the following criteria: (1) The property is sold to another low-income homebuyer who will occupy the unit as his or her principal residence; (2) The original homebuyer receives a fair return on investment; and (3) The property is sold at a price that is affordable to a reasonable range of low-income homebuyers. The City of Joliet defines the original homebuyer's investment as his or her initial investment and capital improvements made during the period of ownership. A capital improvement is the addition of a permanent structural improvement or the restoration of some aspect of a property that will either enhance the property's overall value or increases its useful life. The value of the capital improvement is based on the actual cost of the improvement, as documented by receipts from the homeowner. The City includes the following capital improvements for purposes of determining fair return:

- **Additions:** bedroom, bathroom, deck, garage, porch, patio
- **Lawn & Grounds:** landscaping, driveway, walkway, fence, retaining wall, swimming pool
- **Exterior:** storm windows/doors, new roof, new siding
- **Insulation:** attic, walls, floors, pipes and duct work
- **Systems:** heating system, central air conditioning, furnace, duct work, central humidifier, central vacuum, air/water filtration systems, water heater, soft water system, plumbing, wiring, security system
- **Interior:** built-in appliances, kitchen modernization, flooring, wall-to-wall carpeting, fireplace

The following improvements are not considered capital improvements:

- Any costs of repairs or maintenance that are necessary to keep the home in good condition but do not add to its value or prolong its life, including painting (interior or exterior), fixing leaks, filling

holes or cracks or replacing broken hardware.

- Any costs of any improvements that are no longer part of your home, such as wall-to-wall carpeting that you installed but later replaced.
- Any costs of any improvements whose life expectancy, when installed, was less than 1 year.
- The value of any labor you did yourself or did not pay for.

4. Plans for using HOME funds to refinance existing debt secured by multifamily housing that is rehabilitated with HOME funds along with a description of the refinancing guidelines required that will be used under 24 CFR 92.206(b), are as follows:

The City of Joliet uses the average percentage change in median home prices over the period of ownership for the nine county Chicago Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA) as its standard index for fair return on investment. The Chicago PMSA, as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau, includes the counties of Cook, DeKalb, DuPage, Grundy, Kane, Kendall, Lake, McHenry and Will. In declining housing markets, where home values may be depreciating, the original HOME-assisted homebuyer may not receive a return on his or her investment because the home sells for less or the same price as the original purchase price. In these circumstances, this would be considered a fair return.

In addition to ensuring that the original homebuyer receives a fair return on his or her investment, the City of Joliet must ensure that the housing is affordable to a reasonable range of low-income homebuyers. The City of Joliet has determined that a reasonable range of low-income homebuyers are families with incomes between 70 and 80 percent of area median income and that housing is affordable when no more than 30 percent of a low-income homebuyer's income is spent on the fixed costs of owning a home: principal, interest, property taxes and insurance (PITI). Under no circumstances can the resale price of the affordable unit exceed 95% of the median purchase price for the area as determined by HUD. In some instances, it may be necessary for the City of Joliet to provide HOME assistance to the subsequent homebuyer to ensure that the original homebuyer receives a fair return and the unit is affordable to the defined low-income population. In this case, the additional HOME investment may extend the original period of affordability. The original HOME investment plus any additional HOME investment cannot exceed the maximum per unit subsidy as the cost of assisting a subsequent homebuyer is a project-specific cost.

Under the resale provision, the City of Joliet will record a separate deed restriction agreement to ensure that the HOME-assisted unit qualifies as affordable housing for the duration of the affordability period. The resale provision will be triggered by any transfer of title during the established HOME period of affordability.

The affordability restrictions imposed by deed restriction may terminate upon foreclosure, transfer in lieu of foreclosure or assignment of an FHA insured mortgage to HUD. The City of Joliet will

include language in the deed restriction that it may use purchase options, rights of first refusal or other preemptive rights to purchase the housing before foreclosure to preserve affordability. However, the affordability restrictions must be revived according to the original terms if, during the original affordability period, the owner of record before the termination event, obtains an ownership interest in the housing.

Ongoing monitoring of the principal residency requirement during the period of affordability will consist of verifying on an annual basis that the homebuyer's name appears on the water billing records for the home.

Discussion:

The City of Joliet is in the process of revising its CDBG and HOME Policies and Procedures. The City is joining the Will County HOME Consortium and the County will assume the administrative responsibilities of the HOME Program. The City's HOME funds will be administered by Will County beginning with the FY 2016 HOME Program Year. In addition, the City's Program Year will be changed from January 1 to October 1. The FY 2015 will therefore be extended to September 30, 2016 in order to be in conformance with the Will County Program Year.

(Continued from Question 2.)

In the event that there are insufficient net proceeds available at sale to recapture the full pro-rata amount due, the homebuyer is not required to repay the difference between the prorated direct HOME subsidy due and the amount the City of Joliet is able to recapture from available net proceeds. In the event that that ownership of the HOME-assisted housing is conveyed pursuant to a foreclosure or other involuntary sale, the City of Joliet will attempt to recoup any net proceeds that may be available through the foreclosure sale.

Also included in the recapture agreement is the provision for noncompliance, in which (1) the original HOME-assisted homebuyer no longer occupies the unit as his or her principal residence but no transfer

has occurred; or (2) the HOME-assisted unit was sold during the period of affordability and the applicable recapture provisions were not enforced. In the event of non-compliance, the prorated reduction included in the recapture agreement with respect to a property transfer does not apply and the full amount of the direct HOME subsidy is due and payable. The City of Joliet will utilize all legal means available to recoup the entire direct HOME subsidy in the event of noncompliance by the homebuyer.

The City of Joliet imposes recapture requirements for its First-Time Homebuyer Downpayment Assistance Program in the mortgage, note and recapture agreement, which is executed by the homebuyer at the time of sale and filed with the Recorder of Deeds in Will or Kendall County, depending upon the housing unit's location. The recapture requirements within these documents are triggered by the sale or transfer of the HOME-assisted property.

Ongoing monitoring of the principal residency requirement during the period of affordability will consist of verifying on an annual basis that the homebuyer's name appears on the water billing records for the home.

In the event that the City of Joliet provides HOME funds to a subrecipient or CHDO to develop and sell affordable housing, and a direct HOME subsidy is made to the homebuyer of the HOME-assisted property, a recapture agreement between the City of Joliet and the homebuyer is executed by the homebuyer at the time of sale and filed with the Recorder of Deeds in Will or Kendall County, depending upon the housing unit's location. The terms of the recapture agreement are the same as those outlined above for the City of Joliet's First-Time Homebuyer Downpayment Assistance Program.

- In the Ridgewood Community, the Shawnita Water Association proposes to put in water and sewage lines and needs the City to provide the services or even subsidize the tap-in

fees. This project would be west of Bridge Street, north of Bass Street in the Ridgewood Neighborhood, just outside the City limits and would affect 50 to 100 homes.

Mike Mahler:

- There are 46 homes at the edge of what is presently covered by the City's sewer and water system.
- The project would cost the County \$500,000.
- Presently, the system is antiquated.
- Residents request consideration for extensions of lines to these area and subsidies for the tap-in fees to the residents with access to the new system.
- They are not asking for a new sewer system

Alfredo Melesio:

- The city has lowered the tap-in fees for previous projects

Ron Pullman:

- The water project is a priority for the County.
- 70% of the County's lead abatement grant was spent in the City.
- The water project would cost a total of \$534,000.

Tim Mack:

- I submit a list of projects the County has worked on with the City for the record.

- CDBG funds can be spent in Districts 4 and 5.
- Housing construction must benefit low- and moderate- income individuals.

Interpreter:

- There is a need for lighting in the rear alleys in District 5. Electric poles are in the rear alleys but just need arms for the lights.

Lorraine Guerrero:

- There is a need for more accessible improvements. There is a City program for accessibility.
- There is terrible public transit system in Joliet and in Illinois.

Darlene Diamond:

- Clients cannot afford rents.

Judy Easley:

- There are people with 10 children trying to find homes and are sometimes denied a home or apartment.
- Shelters in the City are full. Domestic violence shelters are full.
- There is a need for more shelters of all kinds.

- There is a need for more transitional housing programs.
- Mental health facilities cannot help people unless they have tried to commit suicide.
- The homeless have many health issues that are tied to their homelessness.

Gentlemen from Catholic Charities:

- Catholic Charities has submitted an application for funds to build more shelters, but needs the supportive services in the shelters.

Amy Sanchez:

- There is a need for cooperation and communication between all of these social service agencies.
- The Continuum of Care organization is important.
- Information needs to be shared amongst all organizations in the City.
- Organizations need to think "outside the box" of Joliet and look for other sources of funding.

Interpreter:

- Her church organizes weekend clean-ups of residents' houses and properties.
- Maybe a proportion of CDBG funds could go to help with these clean-ups.
- There could also be money allocated to clean up the green spaces in the City.
- Potentially hire local landscaping firms to do the clean-up work.
- There is a need to fix the streets and walks.

Alfredo Melesio:

- We need to bring other people into the discussion of social service needs in the City to think "outside the box."

Amy Sanchez:

- We do not want CDBG money to replace the City's infrastructure improvement money. CDBG money should not supplant the existing funds.
- CDBG funds should be targeted to Districts 4 and 5.

Mac Willis:

- The City needs to adopt some very bold strategies. These strategies should focus on the underserved neighborhoods in the City.
- These strategies need to be in front of everyone.

Lorraine Gherero:

- The City can't just "try." They have to do the maximum and exceed expectations, not just meet requirements.

Mac Willis:

- With all of these projects, there needs to be customer satisfaction from the residents of Joliet.

Amy Sanchez:

- There is a need to develop a park facility with ball fields.
- People in low-income areas need to have the same level of services as those in higher income areas.
- We need to keep the City safe.

Mac Willis:

- The City needs to aggressively pursue other Federal and State funds, i.e. Riverside grants to improve their riverfronts.
- The City has to tap other, external resources.




Mr. Alfredo Melesio opened the public hearing at 5:30 PM. He stated the purpose of the meeting and thanked everyone present for coming to the hearing. Mr. Melesio stated that the City of Joliet is eligible to receive \$889,834 in CDBG funds for FY 2015, and \$350,143 in HOME funds for FY 2015. Every five years the City has to prepare a Five Year Consolidated Plan. The City has prepared a "draft" Five Year Consolidated Plan and FY 2015 Annual Action Plan. These documents were placed on public display at City Hall and the Joliet Public Library beginning March 6, 2015 and will be on display until April 6, 2015 for a period of 30 days. It will be presented to City Council for review and approval on Monday evening, April 6, 2015. These documents are also on the City's website at www.cityofjoliet.info. He then turned the meeting over to Mr. Walter J. Haglund, the City's Planning Consultant.

Mr. Haglund introduced himself and explained what the Five Year Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan are. He then reviewed the six (6) priority areas: Housing, Homeless, Special Needs, Community Development, Economic Development, and Administration/Management. He then read the strategies for each of the priorities.

Mr. Haglund then reviewed the proposed budget for FY 2015.

The following CDBG activities are proposed for funding under the FY 2015 Annual Action Plan:

• Public Facility – Non-Profit Agencies	\$ 75,000
• Landscaping/Tree Planting in Low/Mod Areas	\$ 10,000
• Public Services for the Homeless	\$ 45,000
• Public Improvements – Streets	\$ 208,000
• Evergreen Terrace Development	\$ 345,000
• Emergency Home Repairs	\$ 45,000
• Acquisition for Homesteading	\$ 25,000
• Demolition/Clearance	\$ 45,000
• General Administration/Planning	\$ 100,834

Total FY 2015 CDBG Funds for Project Activities = \$889,834

The following HOME activities are proposed for funding under the FY 2015 Annual Action Plan.

• New Housing Construction	\$ 150,100
• Rental Housing Development	\$ 35,000

Total FY 2015 HOME Funds for Project Activities = \$350,143

After the presentation, Mr. Melesio asked if anyone present had any comments or questions concerning the Five Year Consolidated Plan and FY 2015 Annual Action Plan.

Ms. Courtney Suchor from Catholic Charities stated that affordable housing is the greatest need in the City. The rents are too high for lower income residents and they need tenant based rental assistance. Has the City thought about budgeting funds for tenant based rental assistance?

Mr. Melesio said, "Yes, however the City has decided to fund new rental housing construction and rehabilitation of rental housing instead of tenant based rental assistance."

Ms. Suchor said that the City needs to provide financial incentives for developers to provide affordable housing.

Mr. Melesio said the City is providing financial incentives under its HOME program to develop more affordable housing to lower income households in the City.

Ms. Tabitha Bosheers asked about "homestead houses" and how it would work.

Mr. Melesio said that the City was budgeting funds this year to start a "Homestead Housing Program." The City historically has purchased the properties, rehabilitates the houses if feasible or constructed new houses, written down the cost, and sells the house to a lower income family. The funds would then be recycled to the program.

Mr. Samuel Knight asked, "What is required for social service agencies to receive funds?"

Mr. Haglund explained that HUD requires that a social service agency can receive CDBG for 3 years for a new program or a quantifiable increase in an existing program.

Ms. Suchor asked about Evergreen Terrace and the relocation plans of the City.

Mr. Melesio responded that based on the Settlement Agreement with HUD, the City will not be required to have a one for one replacement. However, the City will provide full relocation benefits to all residents who move from Evergreen Terrace. Mr. Melesio then explained the relocation costs and sources of funding for the acquisition and relocation.

Mr. Craig Purchase asked about the need to have more landlord participation in the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Program.

Mr. Melesio stated that the Housing Authority has been meeting with the landlords. Landlords in the City and County are receptive to taking tenants with Housing Choice Vouchers. The Housing Authority has also been applying to the State for Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC) to develop affordable housing with private developers.

Mr. Samuel Knight brought up discrimination in housing based on income.

Mr. Haglund responded that "income" is not a "protected class" and therefore it is not covered by the Fair Housing Act.

Mr. Knight also mentioned that there are two (2) landlords that have a large number of rental units. They present problems and overcharge lower income persons.

There being no further questions or comments, Mr. Melesio closed the public hearing at 6:20PM. Mr. Melesio again thanked everyone for attending.

In attendance: Jim Hock, City Manager; David Mackley, Director, Buildings and Inspectional Service Division; Alfredo Melesio, City of Joliet; Walter Haglund, Urban Design Ventures; Jonathan Russell, Urban Design Ventures.

The consultants introduced themselves and explained the CDBG planning process.

City Manager:

- Should all of the CDBG monies go to Evergreen Terrace? There might be an appeal process with the lawsuit but probably not.
- The City and the owner of the building have two different values for the property.
- The Emerald Ash Bore has destroyed around 9,000 trees in Joliet which all need to be taken down.
- The state has an interest free loan for tree removal for up to \$5 million.
- Joliet has budgeted around \$150,000 for planting new trees this year.
- The roads in Joliet are in decent shape.
- They are digging a tunnel underneath the river to act as a storage tank for combined sewage overflow. The first phase of the project will cost \$12 million. The total project will cost \$88 million over the next 5 years. The tunnel will be 8ft in diameter.
- City council had a concern that the City's fire hydrants were not delivering enough pressure.
- Some of the water mains for the hydrants should be enlarged to accommodate more water flow.
- There is a need for a Limited English Proficiency Plan and funds to implement it.
- The City should not change the dates of its CDBG program year.
- There is a need for emergency first responders to have English language translation software.

Buildings and Inspectional Service Division:

- There are no major building or inspection issues in the City.
- The retaining wall on Jefferson Street by the Catholic High School should be replaced or fixed.
- There is a need for a day shelter for the homeless.
- The roads are in poor condition.

In attendance: John Greuling, Will county Center for Economic Development; Michael Trench, The Community Foundation of Will County; Alfredo Melesio, City of Joliet; Walter Haglund, Urban Design Ventures; Jonathan Russell, Urban Design Ventures.

The consultants introduced themselves and explained the CDBG planning process. Walt discussed the benefits of the Section 108 program and how it could be used in Joliet.

Will County Center for Economic Development:

- There are a lot of entry level positions, but not great jobs in the healthcare sector. However, there are very high end jobs in the industry
- There is a vacant hospital on Springfield Ave that needs to be rehabilitated for a new use.
- If the Section 108 loan was tied to a TIF, it might work for that project.
- There is some potential for expansion of a hospital in the City.

The Community Foundation of Will County:

- The Community Foundation funds:
 - Health initiatives
 - Education
 - Human services
- They have tried to look at venture partnering, but that takes a kind of creativity that is not usually present in small nonprofits. They usually get proposals for items such as a dishwasher or a van from nonprofits.
- Lots of nonprofits have shovel ready projects.
- It might be a good idea to do many small projects in the community with the CDBG funds.
- Senator McGuire has suggested a "Latino Welcome Center," with 1 or 2 fulltime social workers on staff who speak Spanish and can work with all of the nonprofit agencies.
- There is a need for first responders to have ESL skills.
- With limited funding, the collaborative piece is so important.

Meeting with Police Chief and Fire Chief

Thursday, July 17, 2014 @ 1:00 PM

In attendance: Chief Joe Formahls, Joliet Fire Department; Chief Brian Benton, Joliet Police Department; Walter Haglund, Urban Design Ventures; Jonathan Russell, Urban Design Ventures.

The consultants introduced themselves and explained the CDBG planning process.

Police Chief:

- The Police Department gets grants for specific projects and equipment.
- 911 money comes in through a telephone surcharge.
- They work in low-income areas.
- The YMCA is requesting a grant for police officers assigned to the Forrest Park Center. This grant would cover their salaries and benefits of roughly \$250,000 a year.
- There is a need for a hostage crisis truck for the City. This truck is estimated to cost \$80,000. They get an average of 5 calls per year that would require a hostage crisis truck.
- The Police Department is comprised of 261 uniformed sworn police officers.
- The Police Department gets approximately 90,000 calls per year.
- There are 2 police stations:
 - 1 central station
 - 1 station is in the far west, near Kayton Town Road
- There is a need for funding for a joint fire and police training facility.
- Most crime is gang related, such as violent crime and drug related crime. Most of the drug traffic comes in from Chicago.
- The Police Department was given a building that borders the Des Plaines River. They want to use it for evidence storage and emergency equipment.
- There is a need for real-time crime tracking technology. This is an information network sharing system.

Fire Chief:

- The Fire Department responds to roughly 20,000 calls per year.
- The department regularly applies for grant funding.
- Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) funds has brought in \$2.2 million and funds 8 fire personnel.
- They are looking for \$1.2 million for the relocation of the fire station and to provide more assistance to firefighters.
- There is a need for funds to purchase "OptiCom" software to make the lights turn green for the fire trucks.

- The Fire Department has:
 - 9 stations
 - 205 fulltime paid firefighters
 - Two new ambulances are in the City's budget for this year. These ambulances are the greatest need of the Fire Department.
- Almost all of the fire personnel are paramedics.
- Station 4 might move to better serve the area.
- Arson alarms are down in the city.
- Many of the fires are traditional kitchen fires.
- There are no problems with the fire hydrants.
- The Fire Department and the City have done a good job with the water supply.

The consultants introduced themselves and explained the CDBG planning process.

Will County Center for Community Concerns:

- The Center is the lead agency for the Will County Continuum of Care and include Grundy and Kendall Counties.
- The organization delivers a lot of services including:
 - Rental assistance
 - Energy assistance
 - LIHEAP
 - Homeless services project with the County CDBG Funds
 - Lead abatement
 - Weatherization
- The Continuum of Care is not a separate 501(c)3 from the Will County Center for Community Concerns.
- They have decreased supportive service funding and reallocated it to housing.
- A glaring need in the community is for good, safe, decent, and affordable housing.
- Joliet has more housing than the surrounding areas, but it is of a lesser quality and less expensive.
- Joliet has less expensive housing, more services, and more public transportation than other areas in Will County.
- There are 500 industrial warehouses in the area, but not all of them are accessible from public transportation.
- When making financial decisions, people will choose to keep their cars instead of their houses.
- The “Point-In-Time” street count varies between 10-50 individuals each year.
- The homeless population that is housed, is between 300-500 persons.

Daybreak

- Catholic Charities and Daybreak are a separate 501(c)3 from the diocese of Chicago.
- They are the Head Start provider for Will County, and provide counseling services through their community service department.

- The Daybreak Emergency Shelter has 120 beds. They have 4 separate centers with 27 units for families and are funded through HUD and state funds
- The organization addresses homeless prevention and works toward rapid re-housing.
- They provide a daily community kitchen meal.
- The organization also has a veteran housing program.
- The organization recently applied to Will County for CDBG funds to have bi-lingual capabilities so they can provide more services to the Hispanic community.
- The community is lacking psychiatric care.
- For mental health care, individuals must go to Madden Mental Health clinic in Chicago.
- Will County tries to maintain mental health services.
- Catholic Charities has a doctor that volunteers once a week to do chronic illness treatments.
- Will-Grundy Medical Clinic does mostly referrals for mental health.
- There is a need for subsidized housing. some poor families are right on the edge of homelessness.
- Vouchers are needed and are preferred over public housing.
- Project based voucher programs can go awry.
- There might be 100 new housing units in the city each year.

Morningstar:

- The organization has over 100 years of Christ centered service and is located in the East Side.
- They operate a drop in center from 8:00am – 5:00pm where homeless have access to showers, water, bathrooms, and HVAC.

The consultants introduced themselves and explained the CDBG planning process.

Cornerstone:

- Will County is their base of operations.
- They provide residential services to the disabled. They have 212 units that house between 4 and 8 individuals.
- The organization has a homeless assistance program with 200 units throughout Joliet.
- They have 3 veteran permanent supportive housing units.
- CHDO funds have gone to build group homes in the past.
- Maximum of 6 individuals per house before triggering a zoning review.

Jeff Gregory:

- Realty Executives works to sell properties for the City through MLS.
- There is a strong Real Estate market - \$125,000 is the average price of a home.
- Home price varies from \$150,000 on the West Side to \$65,000 on the East Side.
- Rents range from \$815 per month for a 1 bedroom apartment to \$966 per month for a 2 bedroom apartment.
- When property goes into default, the county becomes the owner. The City then has first right of refusal.

South Suburban Housing Center:

- The organization is located in Homewood, South Cook County and focuses on fair housing in the region.
- Most of the fair housing enforcement is for the disabled in Will and Grundy Counties.
- The organization does testing for fair housing compliance in real estate sales and covers all protected classes.
- They have been a HUD Certified Counseling Agency since 2000.
- Conducts homebuyer assistance.
- 50% of landlords would not accept vouchers in Joliet. This number is only from the large apartment complexes. Different protected classes get treated differently.

- The organization conducts a series of trainings on how to affirmatively further fair housing.
- They need to spread out their testing.
- Every rental building with more than 3 units is inspected every 2 years.

Housing Authority of Joliet:

- The intent of public housing is to build affordable housing
- The Housing Authority of Joliet owns and manages 993 public housing units, and 2/3 of these units are for seniors.
- 330 of their properties are considered "functionally obsolete." These units are primarily rented to families.
- The Housing Authority of Joliet demolished 106 units and bought 50 acres of land to build 116 units. This project, known as Liberty Meadows, cost \$28 million.
- 4,000 people are on the public housing waiting list.
- 2,000 people are on the Section 8 Voucher waiting list. There has been no movement on the voucher waiting list for over 11 years.
- Occupancy rate for the public housing units is 99.2%.
- They are pre-leasing units and usually have 10 applicants per unit. Of those, probably 60% are rejected for various reasons.
- There is no preference given to the homeless.
- The Housing Authority does not meet Section 504 standards.
- They have a nonprofit housing development corporation that could potentially be a CHDO.

Morningstar Mission:

- The organization works with the homeless and poor in the community.
- They have an emergency shelter with 22 beds. Some of the people there are stuck in the cycle of homelessness and cannot move on. As people move up and graduate, they come back and are homeless again.
- Many of the people in the shelter are Joliet residents or residents of the surrounding area.
- Joliet is where most of those in need reside and it is where the social services exist for those in need.

Will County Center for Independent Living:

- The organization's goal is to get people back on their feet from rehabilitation centers.
- They work with housing development and nonprofits to deliver services.
- They have built new rental housing that is affordable and accessible.
- Transportation is a huge need for the community. The region's public transportation is not great. This poor transportation negatively effects those who might want to take night classes.
- Many older units are not accessible and are very expensive to remodel to make them accessible. There is a state grant for retro-fitting that can help with these expenditures.

and Public Utilities Departments, City of Joliet**

The consultant introduced himself and explained the CDBG planning process.

Public Utilities:

- Department needs include:
 - Replacing water mains that have failures
 - Replacing sanitary systems that have failures
 - Funding for several long term projects
- The large pipe under the river has been under construction for the last 4 years. There is a \$20 million contract to get everything done with a potential for another \$33 million contract on top of that.
- Any CDBG money would go to capital, stand-alone projects.
- The County uses CDBG funds to convert individual private wells to systems connected to water and sewage systems.
- There are 24-26 wells remaining in the City.
- The CDC's do a good job of filling in the gaps of community needs.
- There is a need for more sidewalks in high risk areas.
- There is a need for more bike paths.

Community and Economic Development:

- The District 4 and 5 "Quality of Life Plan" identifies a "food desert" and a need for a full service grocery store in the districts. This is not entirely accurate since there are smaller stores that sell groceries.
- There is a need for a commercial loan program to expand current businesses.
- Family business failed in the district because there were not enough incentives. Two of the grocery stores do not have unionized labor.
- New market tax credits is a possibility to get a new grocery stores to locate in the area.
- The City would probably not use CDBG money for these types of activities.
- CDBG has been used for slum and blight removal and public services in the past.
- All of the neighborhoods in Joliet are very livable.
- The department has utilized TIFs for its downtown projects.
- They also granted a TIF for the business park near the Junior College.

- Thousands of projects have been completed within the City's enterprise zone which has been a success.
- The warehouses have provided many jobs to the region.
- Many of the warehouses have a 3rd party logistical company that runs their human resources departments.
- When labor issues came up, the City investigated the concerns. Many of the individuals who were fired, were terminated because they had bad work ethics. The warehouses have to pay \$1,500 for the necessary background testing for each worker. They don't want to have to fire them immediately but instead look at them as an investment.
- The City would love to bring in a steel mill or an auto plant.
- One of the biggest issues facing the City is that individuals have not learned how to be good neighbors including:
 - cutting grass,
 - cleaning up trash, and
 - cleaning windows.
- The schools in the community are adequate.

The consultants introduced themselves and explained the CDBG planning process.

Public Works:

- The department bi-annually rates the streets with a rating of good, fair or poor (\$5.3 million worth of repairs in this category).
- Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) - state collects gas tax and then distributes it to cities. The city gets \$2-3 million annually and \$1 million of these funds goes to street reconstruction.
- The Public Works Department would not supplant MFT money with CDBG money.
- They have a 50/50 program for sidewalks in which the property owner pays for half the cost of the new sidewalk and the City pays for the other half.
- If someone wanted a light in an ally, it would be installed and maintained by Commonwealth Edison (ComEd). There would have to be a request to ComEd to install it and design the light.
- The Public Works department does all roadwork in-house and they pay workers prevailing wage for Will County.
- On the Route 59 project, some of the lighting was installed in the sidewalk and did not allow for the required 36 inch sidewalk clearance for handicapped accessibility.
- Hickory and Spring Creeks create a flooding problem.
- The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) is working to lower the basin of the creeks and make it so the surrounding properties are no longer in a floodplain.
- The department does an annual creek cleaning.
- In 1996 and 1982 the streams flooded.
- The state is looking to redraw the flood maps and downtown Joliet might be in a flood plain.

The consultants introduced themselves and explained the CDBG planning process.

Joliet Public Schools, District 86:

- The school district incorporates only grades K-8.
- The Sr. High is a larger area with feeder districts, known as Joliet Township District 204.
- The Troy School District is more affluent but still in the City.
- The Joliet Public Schools - District 86 has 12,000 students. 20 school buildings are within the district including 16 elementary schools and 4 junior high schools.
- Strongly supported by state aid.
- State aid is inversely proportional to the property assessment.
- They have a balanced budget and a surplus of funds.
- The school district is 50% Hispanic and 25-30% African American.
- The district has a substantial bi-lingual population. Non English speaking students start out learning in Spanish, but after a few years are transitioned entirely to English.
- 100% of the students are on the Federal free or reduced lunch and breakfast program.
- The school district has truancy issues, many students miss more than 5 days a year.
- There are also performance issues in the school system.
- They offer summer school programs and after school programs.
- The district has built 3 new schools in the past 3 years.
- The relationship between the school district and the teachers union is healthy and cooperative.
- There are no charter schools within the school district.

The consultants introduced themselves and explained the CDBG planning process.

YMCA:

- The organization is a faith-based institution that offers enrichment programs to youth.
- The organization serves children and offers a summer camp program. This is not only fun for the kids, but it is a safe place for them to go during the day.
- The program costs around \$44,000 but they only receive \$25,000 from the City to operate it.
- They operate a mentoring program to provide children with positive role models and to give them advice on life decisions.
- They work with high school students to help them graduate. 100% of those in the program graduate from high school and 90% go on to higher education. The organization is not only trying to help them graduate, but try to instill values and character in them to ensure future success in life.
- Employment opportunities for youth are not widespread or easy to obtain.

Joliet Junior College:

- The organization works with students who cannot afford to attend college.
- Some students are fully capable of going to college but are too poor or even homeless.

Prison Services:

- The organization was founded on June 1, 1976 to work with ex-offenders to find them employment.
- Since the organization's inception, they have found 15,000 ex-offenders jobs.
- Of those 15,000, 70% have stayed out of prison.

- If someone cannot find a job after they get out of prison, there is a 70% chance that they will end up back in prison.
- The organization serves 200-300 clients a year. Between 180 and 229 of these clients get jobs.
- Almost all of the people on parole have housing.

Child Care Resource Center:

- The organization works to provide child care to low income individuals in four counties
- The organization is state funded but families have to pay a small copay. As state funding decreases, the amount of money each family pays in a copay increases.
- Outside of the organization, childcare can cost as much as \$150-\$200 a week.

Saint Patrick's Neighborhood Association:

- The organization was developed to improve the neighborhood.
- They direct a lot of neighborhood cleanup efforts.
- Some of the casino money went to each of the council districts. In this neighborhood, 90% of the roads were reconstructed and 70% of the sidewalks were replaced.
- The neighborhood used to be more tightknit but that has changed recently.

Councilwomen Bettye Gavin, Forest Park Community Center:

- The organization is primarily focused on family sustainability.
- They have an emergency food pantry everyday of the week. Serves 30,000 pounds of food to roughly 600 families each year.
- The organization works with youth that have had a slight brush with the law and helps them to get GEDs and jobs.
- The organization works with kids that are 3-5 years old and make sure they are school ready. The program graduates 25-30 kids per year.
- They run an afterschool program for elementary school kids focusing primarily on increasing their homework completion rate. They have computer labs to give children access to technology they wouldn't normally have and also run a laptop program. They also have a program to offer internet to families for \$9.95 a month. Additionally this afterschool program works to get children engaged in community activities.
- They have a job readiness program that incorporates computer training, job skills, interview skills, and a "Second Hand Boutique" for business clothes. This is a relatively new program but has already graduated 5 individuals. 4 of these students have gone into intermodal vocational training and 1 student has gone into electrical vocational training.
- The organization works to help individuals repair their bad credit.
- There are 38 graduates from their Restorative Justice program.
- They work with eligible individuals to make them homeowners.
- They have built 4 homes that are now occupied by residents.

Unity CDC:

- The organization was created in 2007
- They have 4 key focal points:

- Housing
- Transportation
- Employment
- Human Capital
- Works to improve accessibility to housing.
- Homeownership is a huge issue.
- Districts 4 and 5 are the poorest in the City.
- The organization would like to work with the City, especially in Districts 4 and 5.

Mt. Zion Baptist Church, PUSH, Lift 'em Up Ministries:

- Started a food pantry which serves 300-500 families per month.
- The organization offers job training programs with 60 people per training. This program encourages entrepreneurship. Individuals want employment that is better than a temporary job.
- They run an afterschool program in Evergreen Terrace to help students develop skills to get good grades. Some students might have missed skills essential for doing well academically.
- The organization holds a summer program for 60 kids.
- They look for young men to build businesses. Some of the individuals in the program have started landscaping businesses and tire businesses.
- The organization strives to provide cars and transportation so they can get to work.

Warehouse Workers for Justice:

- The organization was formed to address problems with numerous warehouses and distribution centers in the area.
- "People's Right to Work" issues, Poor working conditions.
- The organization is working with the Illinois Department of Labor to have the warehouses and distribution centers adopt fair labor practices.
- The organization supports individuals with labor issues.
- They have won 16-18 lawsuits against warehouses.

Residents of Preston Heights

- It is good to know about the available resources in the community.
- Temp work is like a revolving door. The work is not permanent and only used to get cheap labor that is expendable with no benefits.
- There are 30,000 warehouse jobs in the region.
- Chicago is the second largest port in the World.
- They want a living wage and do not want to be treated as expendable labor.
- Temp firms contract with employers to keep the labor cheap.
- These employers are given tax credits from the City, County, and State.
- Can the CDC become the subcontractor for \$22/hour?

Maurice Fears:

- We need to collaborate with all of these agencies and the "Quality of Life Plans."
- There should be a focus on recreational facilities in Districts 4 and 5.

- There is a need for more food and drug stores in the underserved districts.
- To be effective, there is a need to collaborate with local governments to work toward fixing these problems.
- The disparities are growing in the underserved areas of Joliet.
- We need to start looking at the bigger picture.

Church of God in Christ:

- The organization serves the South Side Community.
- It has a literacy program for children who are failing in school.
- It works toward crime reduction.
- The organization serves around 20 children through the Brightstar Program.
- They have 80 students in their summer camp that focuses on literacy.
- They have a "jobs club" that helps residents look for jobs which also helps with interview preparation. They also focus on summer youth employment and elderly employment.
- "The House of Bethesda" works with ex-offenders.
- "Gateway Housing" is temporary housing for 6 months for 8 ex-offenders.
- "Stepping Stones" helps to put seniors to work.
- There is a huge need for transportation in the City of Joliet. They have a "Ride on Time" program which has a 14 passenger vehicle.
- They are a work site for Joliet Junior College's Work Program.

Will County Center for Community Concerns:

- The organization serves low-income households.
- There is a concern that there is 1 for 1 replacement for housing if Evergreen Terrace is demolished.
- The organization submitted a grant for lead based paint removal and is asking for just under \$3 million. They were funded in 2008 and 2010 and they are the only agency doing lead based paint removal.
- The organization:
 - Works with LIHEAP.
 - Works to help residents with weatherization.
 - Is a certified HUD housing counseling agency.
 - Conducts homeless services.
 - Conducts home repair.
 - Works to mitigate predatory lending.
 - Provides emergency rent services.
 - Works to provide individuals with water.
 - Operates a nutrition program.
- Needs identified:
 - The West Side seems to be doing better than the East Side.
 - Joliet does a good job with services overall.
 - Mental health services are lacking.
 - Public transportation is a huge issue.
 - Road maintenance could use some help.
 - Grocery stores and gas stations cost more on the East Side and on the West Side.

Alfredo Melesio:

- The CDBG Program could potentially do physical improvements to nonprofit facilities. This could include an energy efficiency program. For example, the YMCA needs a new HVAC System for the gym.
- There are needs for handicap accessibility to second floor community areas in nonprofit facilities that could be eligible under the CDBG Program.

- The City of Joliet Park District is responsible for the parks and recreation centers throughout the community.
- The park district improves quality of life by providing recreation centers and parks for the citizens of Joliet.
- Good parks increase property value and encourage business development.
- Each summer, the parks department trains lifeguards and camp counselors to work throughout the parks district.
- The City of Joliet Park District offers free programs through the health club, such as yoga in the park and health screenings.
- All members of the community use the parks.
- The biggest issue in the downtown area of Joliet is the lack of entertainment in the city. There is no real reason to visit the city.
- The East Side of Joliet needs to offer more recreational opportunities to the people in that area, such as fitness trails, sporting events and an indoor recreation center.

- Public housing in the City of Joliet is not good.
- Many of those that apply have credit problems.
- The city should offer classes that offer budgeting advice to new homeowners.
- The problems in Joliet are overwhelming.
 - The job market is poor on the east side of Joliet.
 - Many people throughout the city are not getting enough to eat.
 - Crime and violence in the city needs to be addressed.

- The Senior Services Center of Will County provides programs and services for older adults.
 - They assist with the Meals on Wheels program to provide over 500 homebound elderly people with food. They also have 12 dining sites.
 - They have a case coordination unit that determines if seniors are eligible for programs through the state.
 - The center investigates elderly abuse cases.
 - They offer assistance with registering for Medicare Part D.
 - They provide transportation services to the elderly.
 - They employ senior citizens. Currently, there are 18 seniors working with this organization.
- One of the major community development needs in Joliet is transportation. The seniors are the “forgotten” group.
- Many senior citizens would prefer to remain in their homes. The city needs to offer more assistance to the elderly that would allow them to stay in their homes.
- There are many mental health issues in the City of Joliet. Those who are homebound have limited access to mental healthcare. There is a need for programs that bring mental health professionals to senior's homes.

- The Will County Veterans Assistance Commission helps veterans to obtain VA benefits.
- The program is accredited through the National Association of County Veterans Service Officers.
- The program offers financial assistance to veterans.
- The center offers employment assistance by way of job fairs, speakers, etc.
- The VACWC offers a recreational therapy group.
- The VACWC offers counseling service and meets once per week.
- The Patriots Grant organizes events, such as golf outings, to assist veterans with life changing events.
- The VACWC is working to eradicate homelessness and offers several programs to homeless veterans.
- They work with veterans to help find housing.
- The VACWC works closely with ALL Veterans Organizations, utility companies, landlords, local, state and Federal agencies to insure the rights and benefits to which each veteran is entitled has been granted.
- They offer financial assistance to veterans for housing.
- The VACWC provides assistance with filing claims to the United States Department of Veterans Affairs.
- The MissionContinues.org will meet on September 23rd to discuss community service projects that will re-engage veterans with the community.
- The City of Joliet needs a women's shelter. Currently, homeless, female veterans are sent far away to the nearest women's shelter.
- There is a need for more public transportation in the City.
- There is a lack of senior citizen services in the City of Joliet.

- The area median income determines current rental fees, which are inflated and unaffordable.

- Will County and the City of Joliet offer a wide variety of social services to the community. They need to do a better job of getting the word out about the programs they offer.
- Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) offers programs like homeless prevention and rapid re-housing. All 3 programs ran out of money due to the high homeless population and high rent. The city needs to provide more fair housing and access to it.

It is necessary to make sure that companies moving to Joliet are willing to hire locally. - School enrollment has increased due to "doubled-up" housing.
- The homeless population has increased.

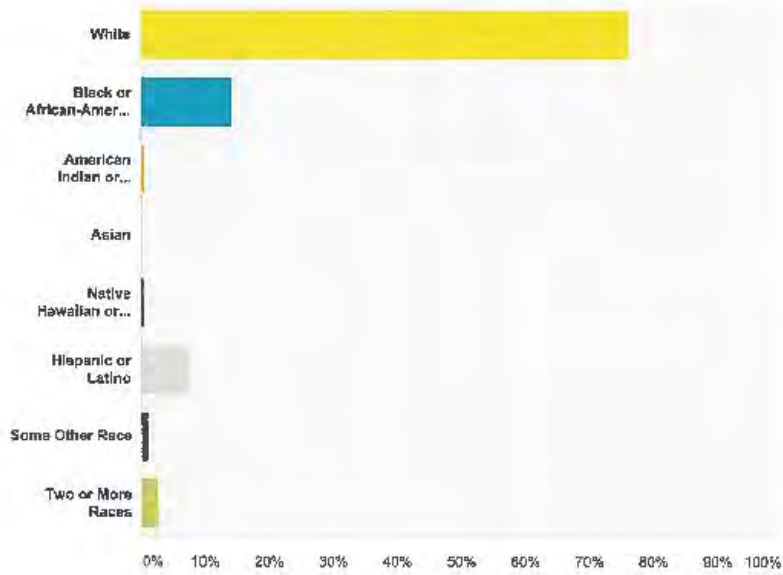

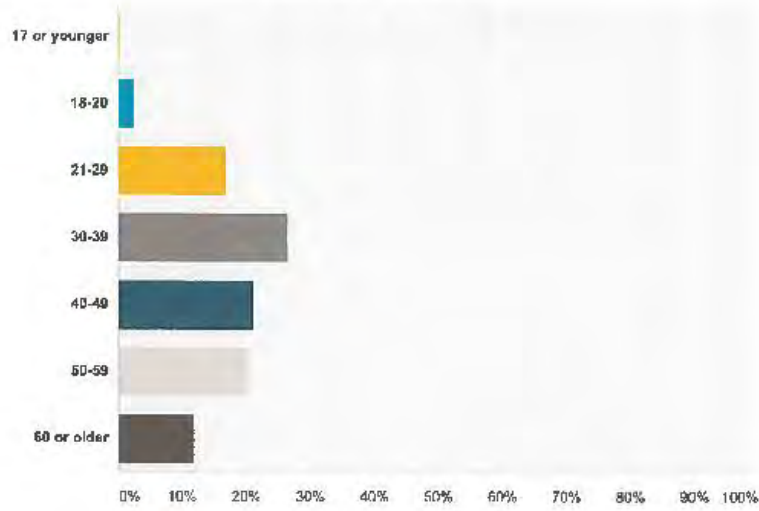

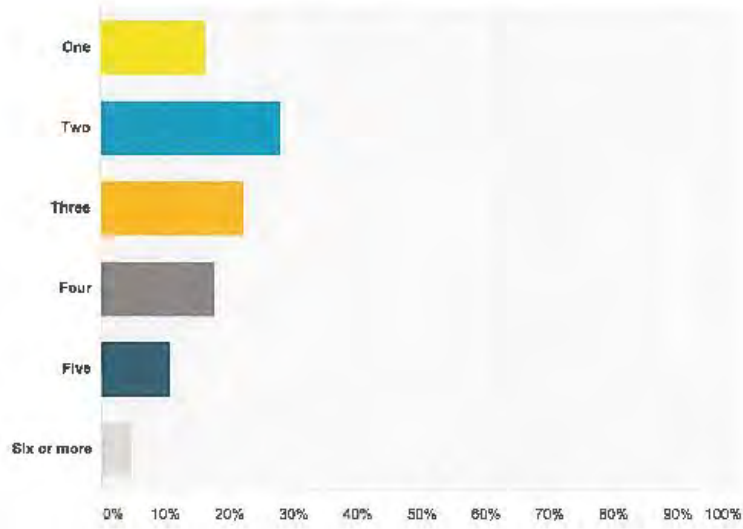

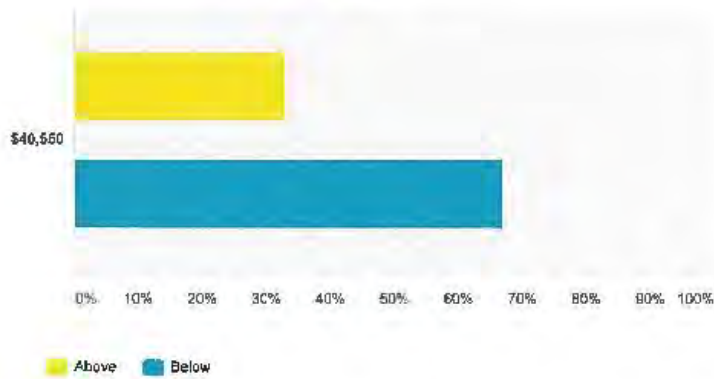

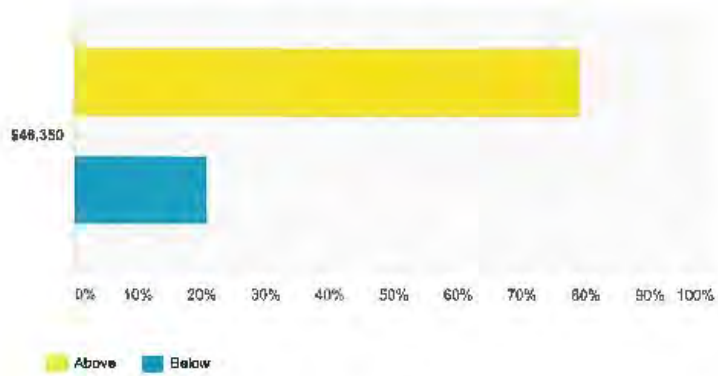

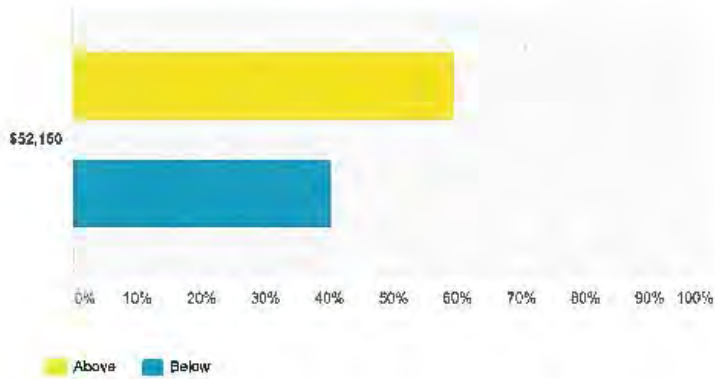

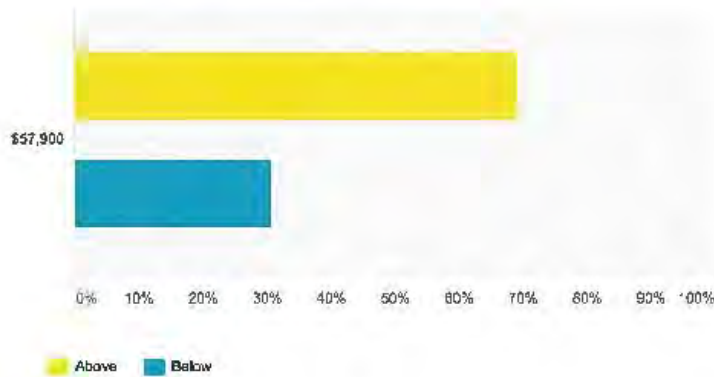

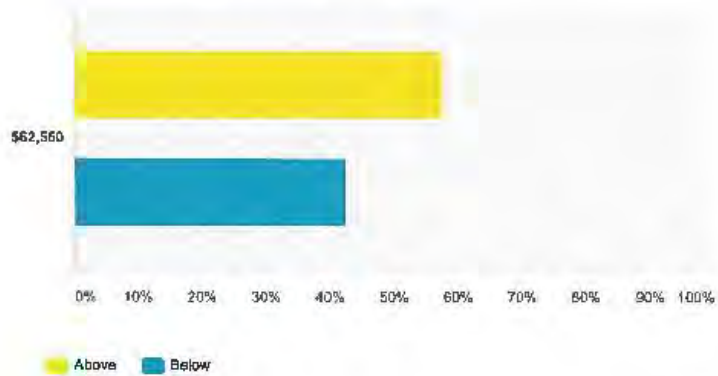

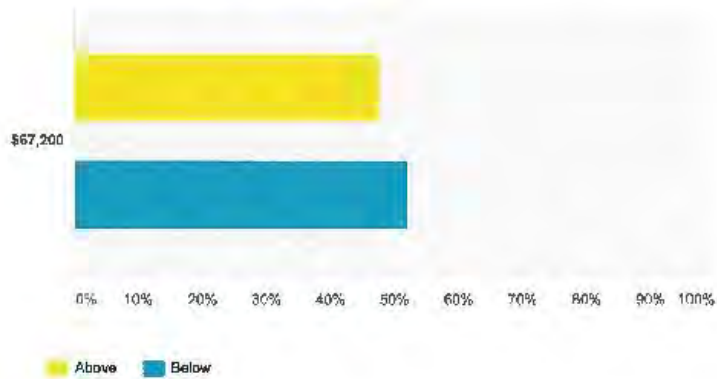

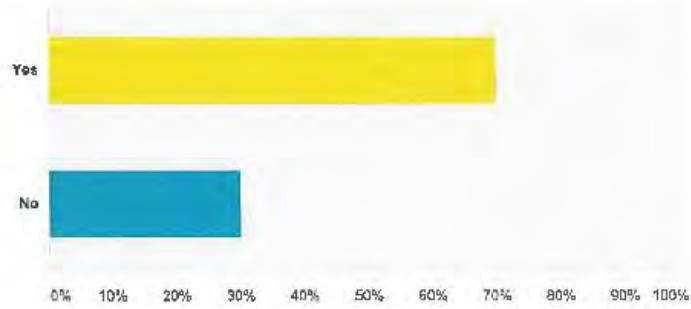

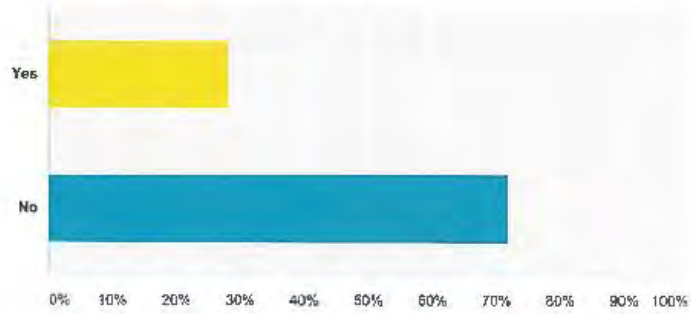

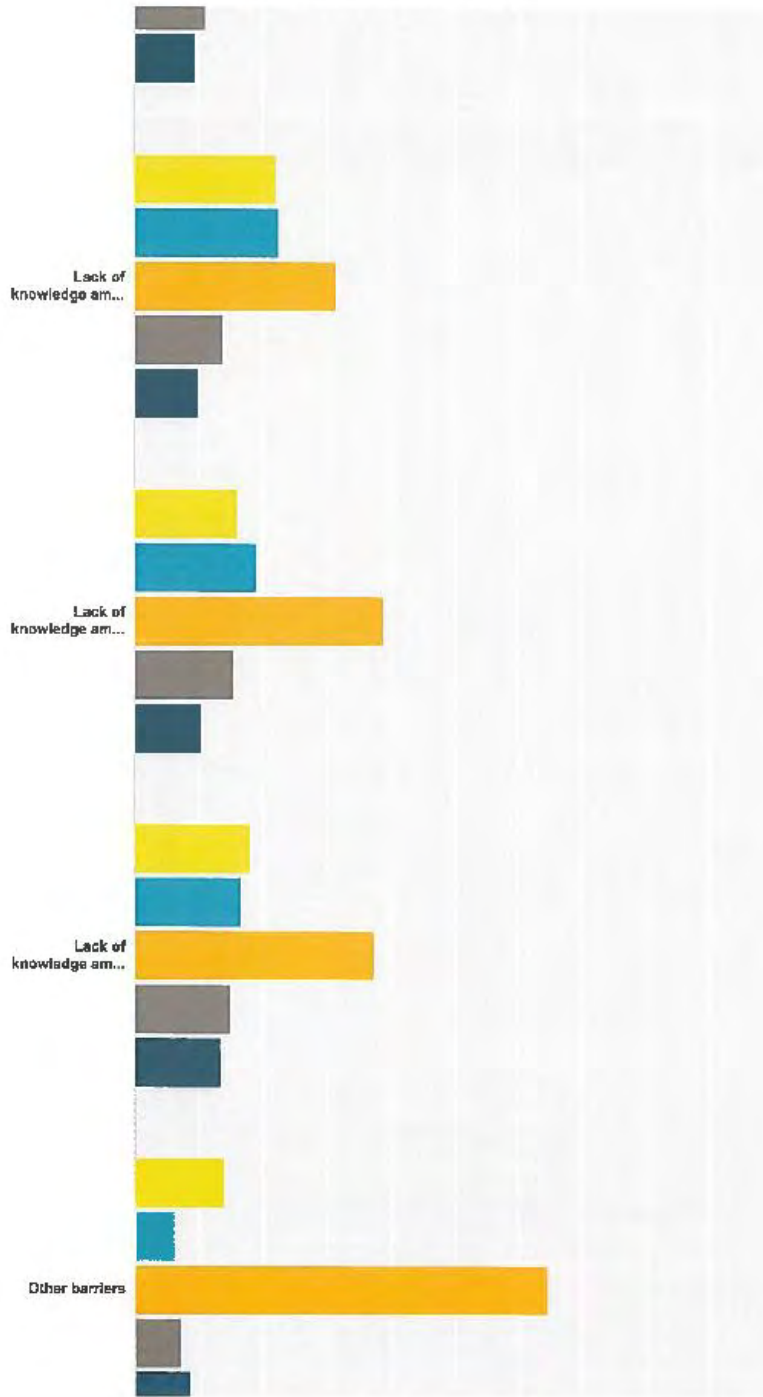

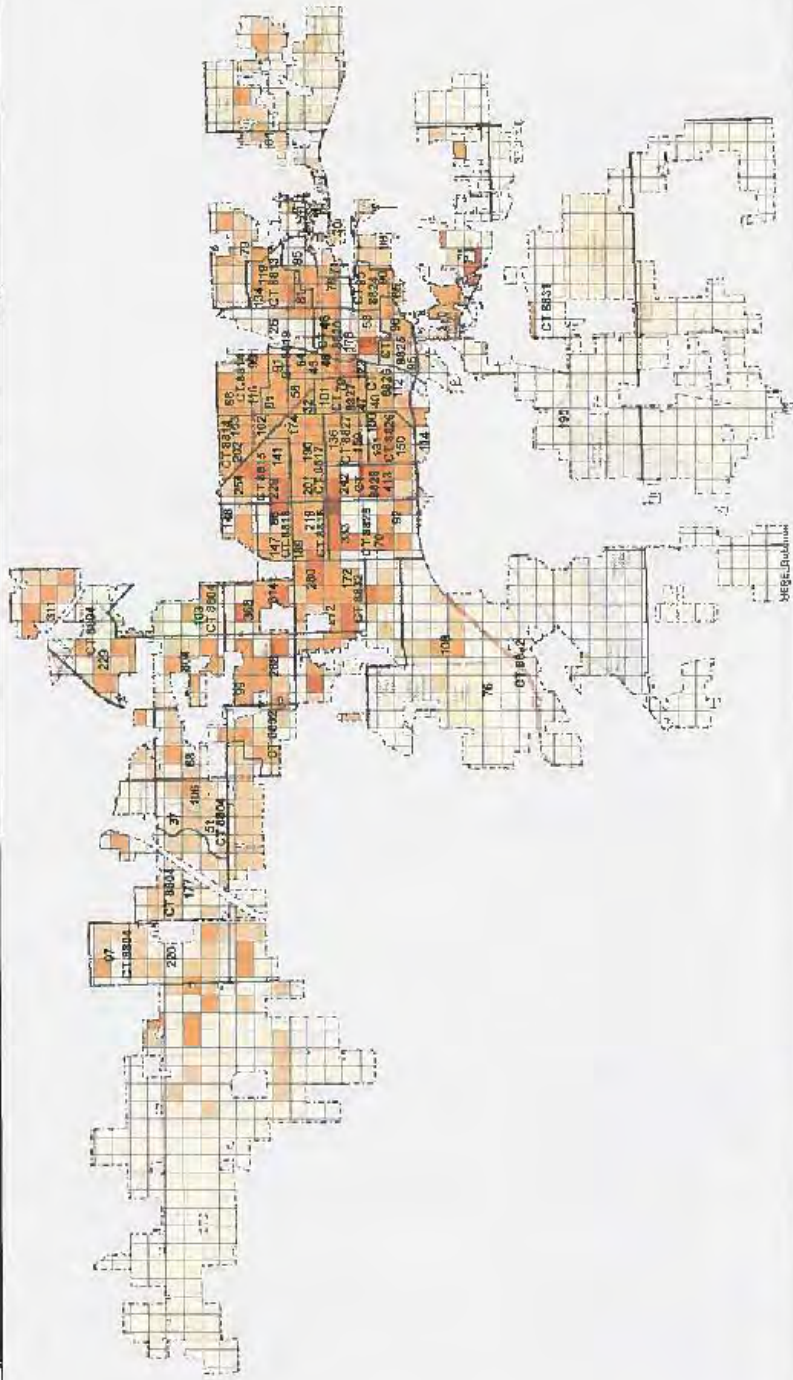

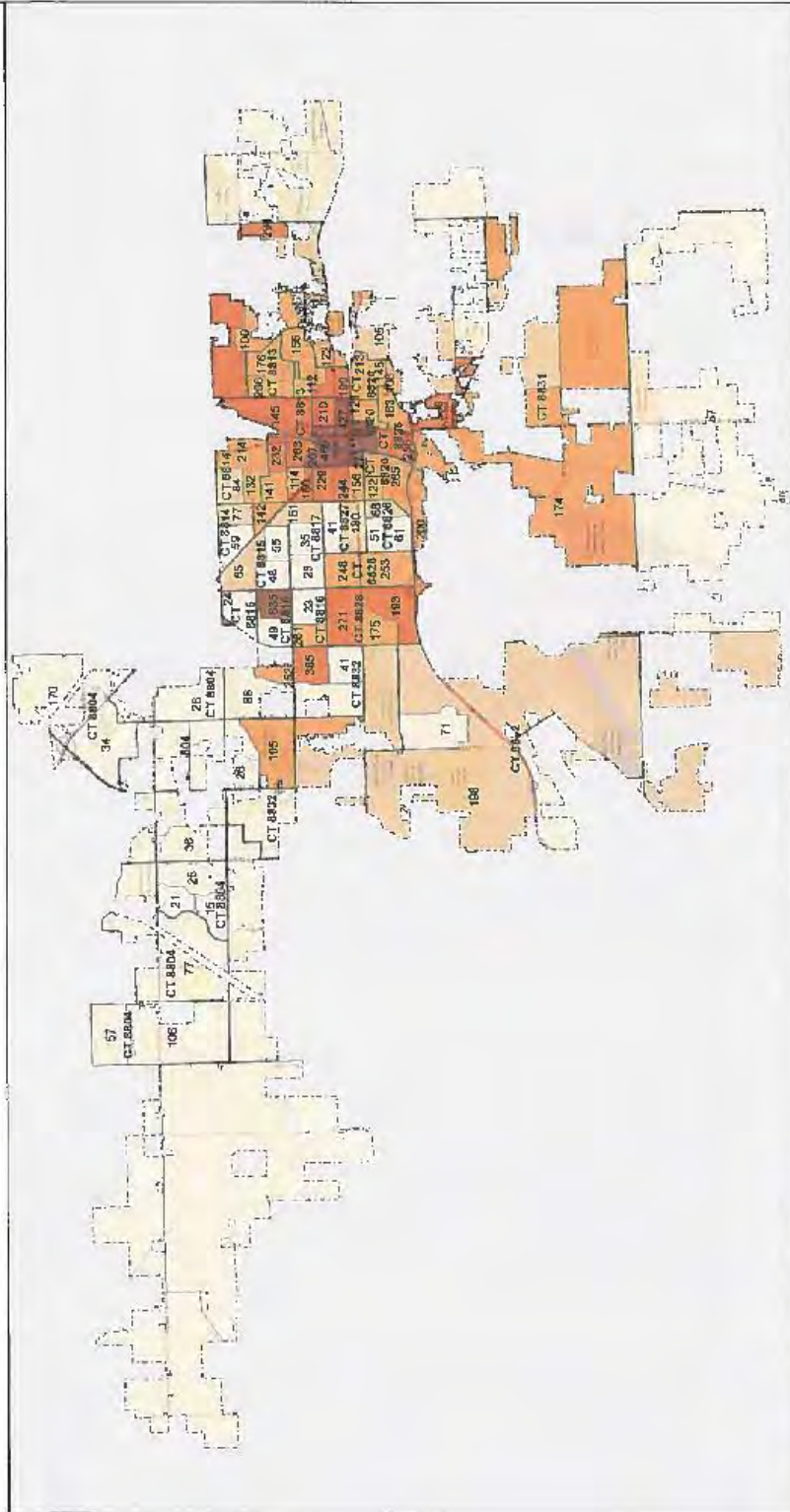

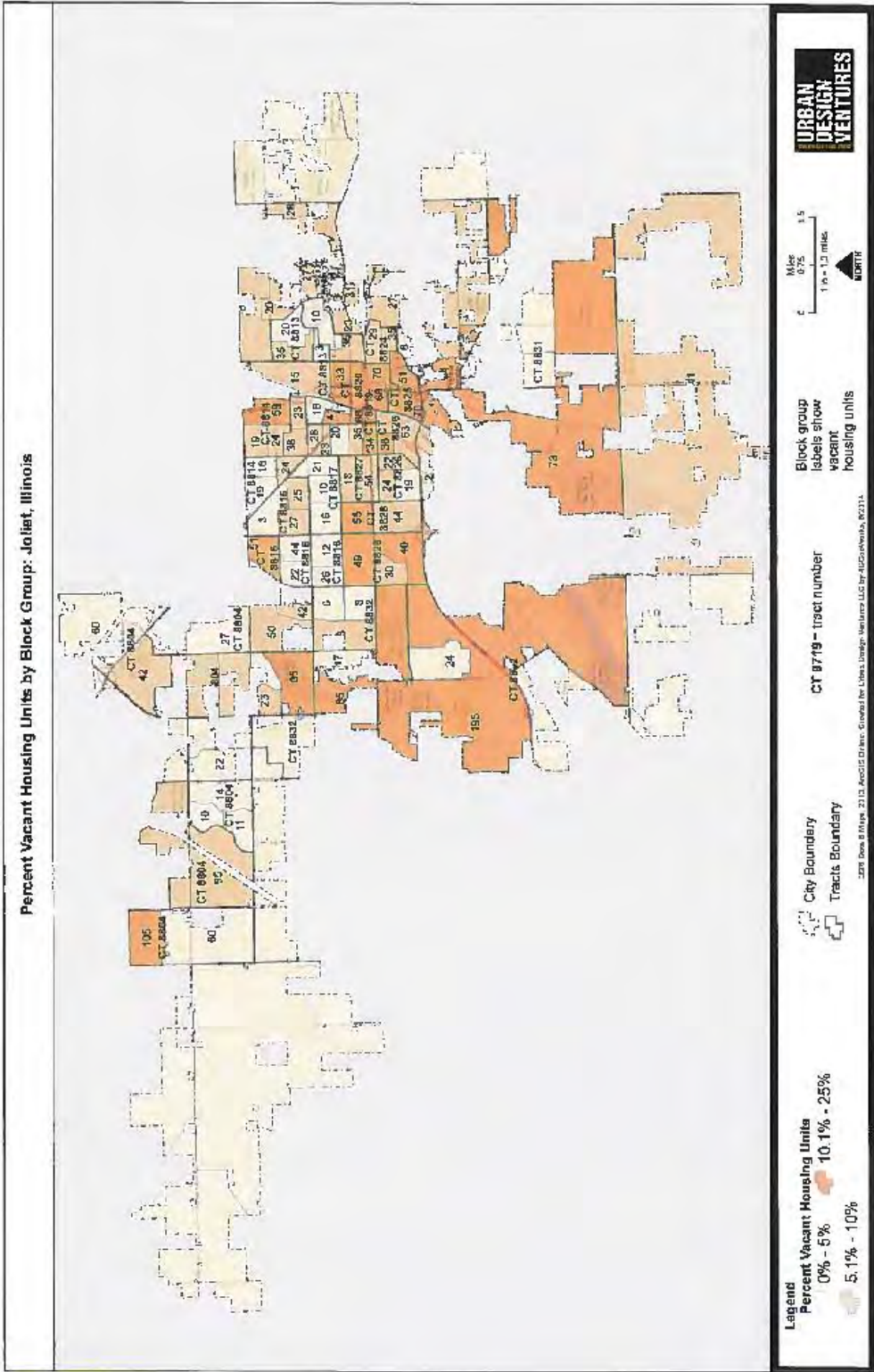

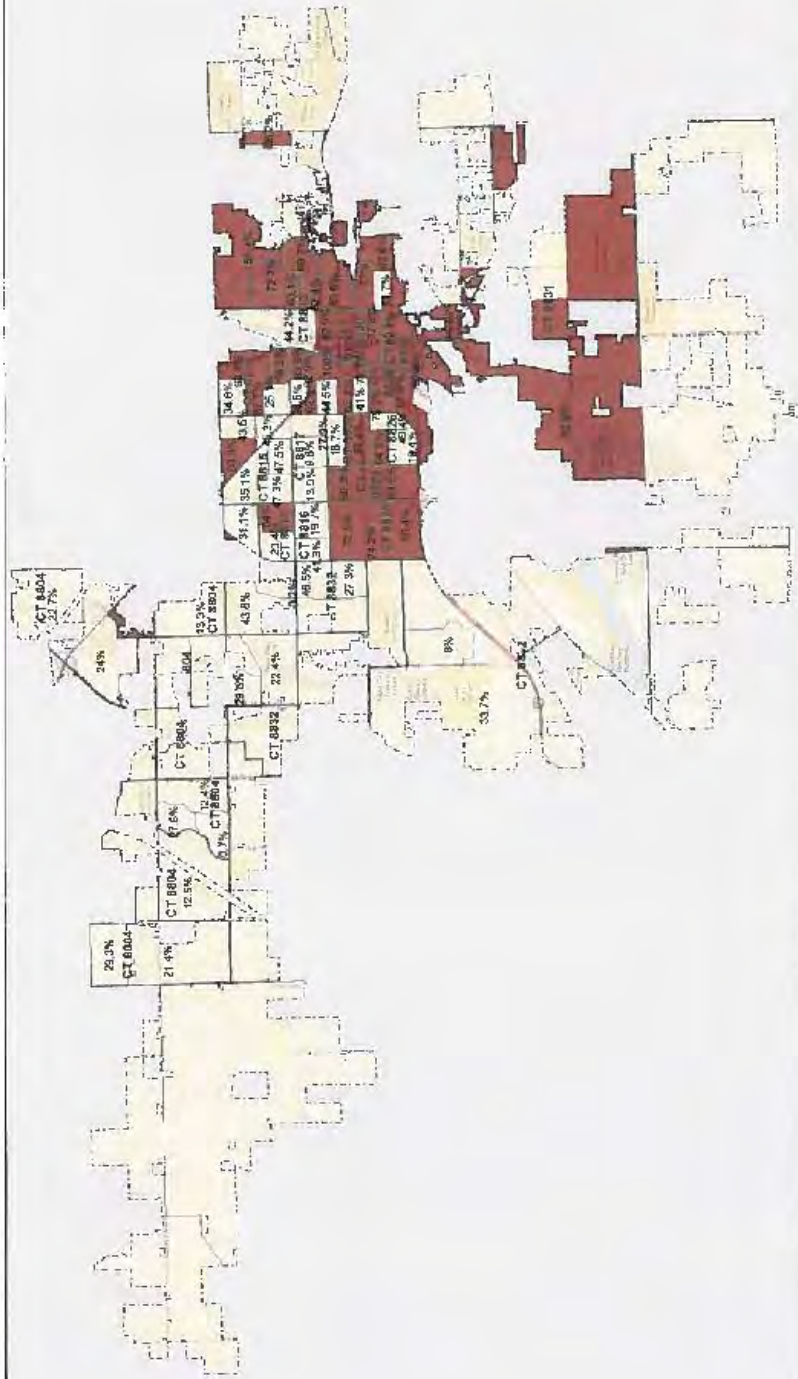

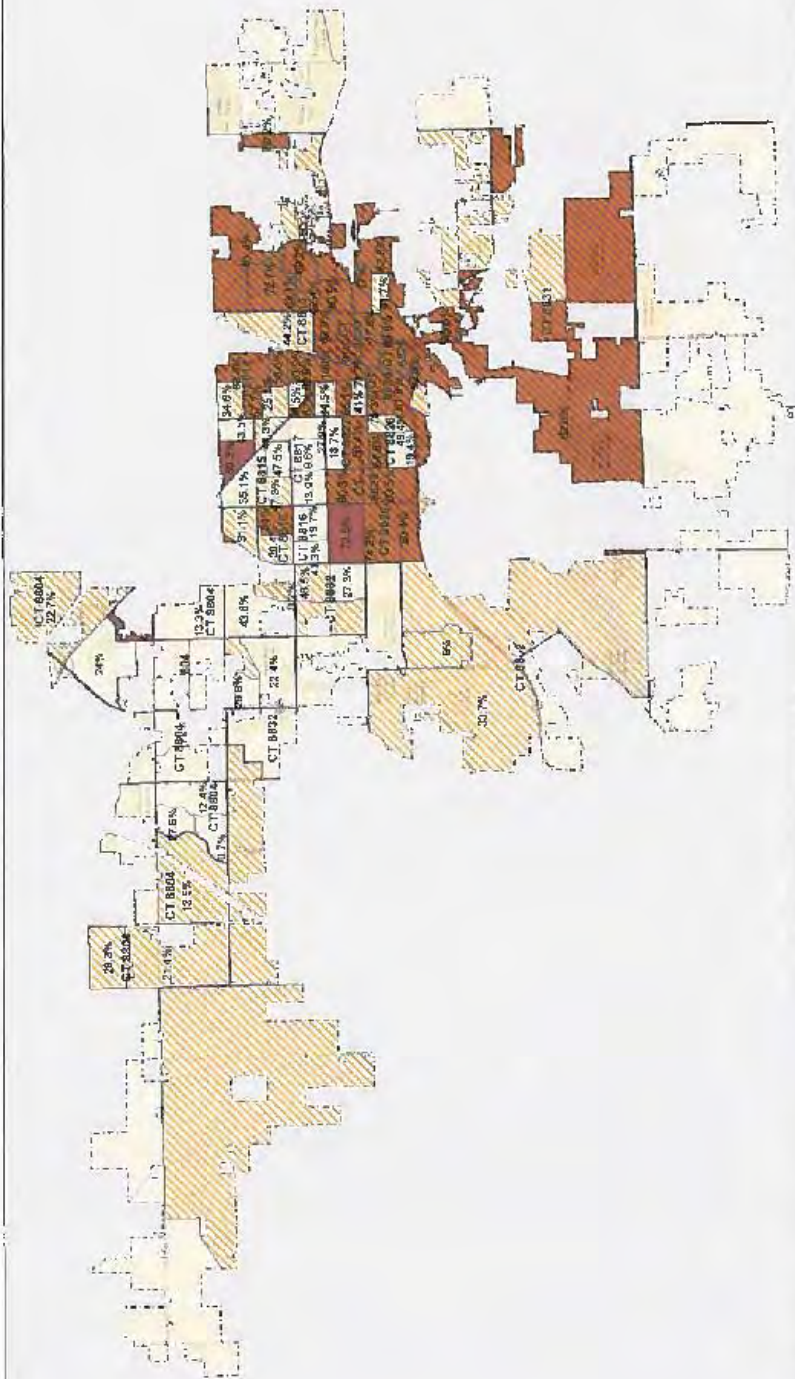

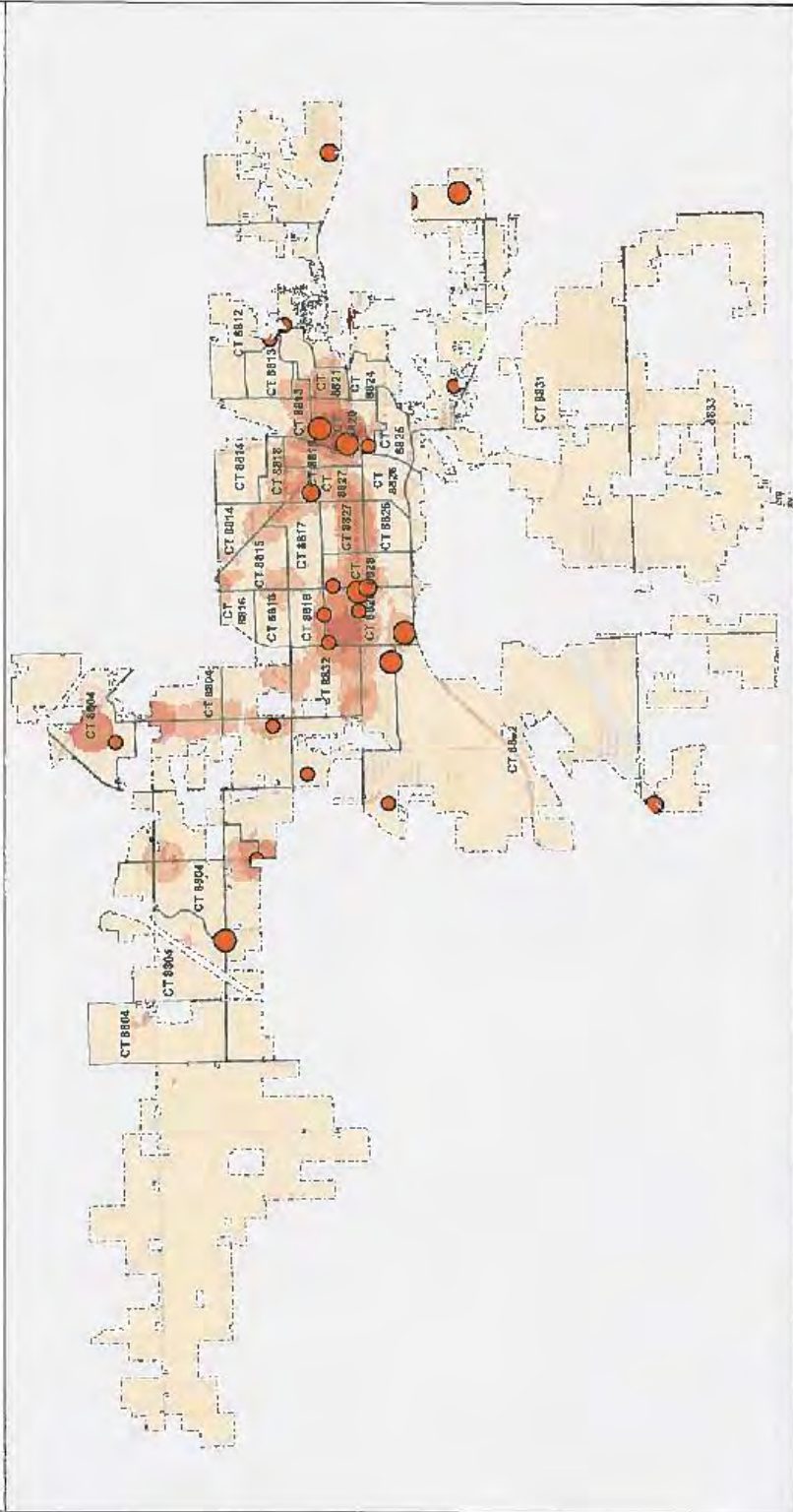

The 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan for the expenditure of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership programs has been completed. Both CDBG and HOME are programs of the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The City will receive an allocation of \$889,834 in CDBG funds and \$350,143 in HOME Investment Partnership funds for FY 2015 later this year.




